THE ELECTION OF THURSDAY

No question of principle, or politics, or religion, or sentiment, or anything of that kind, is involved in the election of a third Sewerage and Water Commission. The election is merely to put upon the Board the best man available. Many citizens would, we know—a large majority would, we believe—have been glad to show their appreciation of the distinguished services rendered by Dr. McLeod in regard to the introduction of both water and sewerage by voting for him upon this occasion. Had he been nominated we are quite sure that some of the candidates would have withdrawn from the field. But Dr. McLeod has not been nominated. Our limit of choice is confined to Messrs Newson, McGregor, Wheatley and Douse. The two former we all know to be practical men of business, accustomed to deal with men in respect to works under construction. With the personal qualifications of Mr. Wheatley we are not so well acquainted, though we believe him to be, in a general way, an estimable citizen. As to Mr. Douse, the experience of the corporation has been that, however worthy of consideration and regard he may be in his private relations, he is not fitted for public position. The danger where there are a number of candidates in the field is that the friends of each of the more desirable being intent upon the election of their own particular candidate and thus dividing their strength, the most undesirable of all may obtain a majority of the votes cast. This danger may, however, be avoided by the friends of the more desirable uniting to vote for the one or the other who leads the poll at a certain hour—say at twelve o'clock; and we hope that this plan will be followed on Thursday next. The electors of Charlottetown, as a whole, ought to act in the circumstances just as the members of a private corporation,—the shareholders in a bank or steamboat company—called upon to elect a director, would act. They ought to throw aside all personal, and private, or outside considerations, and unite to prevent the election of an unsuitable man, and to secure the election of a man fitted for the position.

TO BE NOTED.

Mr. Wise voted with the Opposition last evening on Mr. Campbell's resolution regarding an investigation of the affairs of the Province and the formation of a new policy. But the rest of the Government, members and supporters, voted against the resolution. This fact ought to be noted by all electors,—and remembered when the time comes.

—The Patriot intimates that Mr. Attorney General McDonald is not likely to get the vacant Judgeship. It enlarges upon the ability he has lately displayed as a speaker in the Legislative Assembly. We may hazard the opinion that the party has decided that Hector must remain in politics.

COSTIGAN'S TUMBLE.

For twenty years, during all the time they were in office, the Liberal Conservatives were good enough for the Hon. Mr. Costigan. So long as he drew the salary of a Minister of the Crown he was steadfast to his political friends—approving and taking responsibility for all that they did. If the Liberal Conservative Party has acted an unworthy part in this Canada of ours, Mr. Costigan also is unworthy; if that party is guilty, he also is to be condemned. At the last general election he stood by the Liberal Conservative party. So long as there was prospect that the Liberal Conservatives would remain in office, Mr. Costigan was loyal—even though Sir Charles Tupper and his Cabinet, and all their predecessors in office were as wicked and censurable then as they are now. But now,—now when they are in adversity, now when their opponents are masquerading in political clothes which have been stolen from them and far excelling them in respect to public expenditure, public debt, and wild cat schemes, Mr. Costigan, the Honorable Mr. Costigan, announces his secession from them, and his "adhesion to the Ministerial platform and policy." Mr. Costigan's explanation of his traitorous conduct will be awaited with interest. Sir Charles Tupper intimated the other day, in the course of an interview, that the Government obtained Mr. Costigan's adhesion by indefensible means. Perhaps the Government also, may be called upon to explain the cause of Mr. Costigan's tumble. The explanations will need to be clear and full to satisfy honest men the Mr. Costigan's action, under the circumstances here described, is justifiable upon moral grounds. A political turncoat may be tolerated;—but not a man who deserts his friends in opposition and joins the enemy in office,—for a price.

Manitoba School Lands.

OTTAWA, May 12.—It is understood that Premier Greenway has received an intimation to the effect that the Federal Government will not accede to the request of the Manitoba Government and transfer the school lands to their keeping despite the vote of the local Legislature in that direction. The Federal Government will not part with the trust fund. Last year, while consenting to place \$300,000 to the credit of the Province, they argued that this was only a very small portion of the trust fund which runs to millions of dollars and that, therefore, they were not interfering with the trust. Now they refuse to nullify themselves by taking an action which will be contrary to that argument. It is possible that having failed in this demand Premier Greenway will fall back on his demand of last year for \$300,000, but in this case it will remain to be seen whether the Senate can be induced to reverse their vote of last year.
