

Jews In Soviet Union Facing Complex Future

BRUSSELS (AP)—A report said Sunday the situation and future of Jews in the Soviet Union remains the most complex and frustrating of all the problems facing world Jewry.

The report was presented to the fifth session of the World Jewish Congress at its opening session. About 400 Jewish leaders from throughout the world are attending the meetings which end Aug. 10.

"Recent developments show that there is a growing understanding, even in the Communist world, of the special character of the problem of Soviet Jewry and the need for its solution," the report said.

"Although until now no fundamental changes in the position of the Soviet Jewry have taken place there is nonetheless hope for the future may bring some improvement."

In his opening address to the congress, Chairman Nahum Goldman declared: "Despite anti-Semitic tendencies here and there in the Soviet Union, as in many other parts of the world, the individual Soviet Jewish citizen is not persecuted, is not denied his political rights, nor his economic existence, nor his possibilities of participating in the scientific, cultural and artistic life of his country, although in

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certain spheres some discrimination exists.

"But there is no question that the Jewish minority as such in the U.S.S.R. is denied, contrary to many other minorities, the facilities to live life as a Jewish collective group, with the grave danger that we may lose this second largest and culturally so highly creative community in the course of one or two generations."

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Some Prices Up In Poland

WARSAW (AP)—Poland announced Sunday price boosts on tobacco and fish, price cuts on television sets, refrigerators and light and saw, and pension raises for 2,500,000 workers.

The changes, which went into effect Sunday and today, were announced by the Polish press agency.

The cigarette health hazard was cited as one reason for the tobacco price boost, Poland's first in 12 years. The press agency said Polish tobacco consumption, mainly cigarettes, had increased 40 per cent since the last boost in 1954, and added: "In the light of recent medical research, such a rapid growth of tobacco consumption exerts a negative influence on the health of the population."

Cigarettes now will cost 15-50 per cent more, depending on brand.

The agency said Poland's minimum wage will be raised by 100 zlotys to 850 zlotys (\$30 to \$34) a month.

Arrest Is Made In Navy Death

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. (CP)—Two members of the Royal Canadian Navy were arrested here Saturday in connection with the death of another navy man who fell from a CNR train near here earlier in the day, a Quebec Provincial Police spokesman said Sunday.

The body of Richard Sinclair of Manitoba was found near the railway tracks at nearby St. Rosalie. The police spokesman said a fight broke out aboard the train which was en route from Montreal to Halifax and Sinclair had fallen or been thrown from the train.

The names of the two men arrested were not released and it was not known if charges had been laid.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

East dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding: East South West North Pass 1NT Pass 2NT

Opening lead—jack of spades. Signals are either positive or negative. Thus, if your partner on defense leads the king of a suit headed by the K-Q, you have the A-7-2, you could ask for a continuation of the suit by making a positive signal with the seven—or ask for a discontinuation by making a negative signal with the deuce.

In the same way, if you were void of a suit being led, you could signal positively or negatively by the size of your discard in some other suit. The proper use of signals such as these is highly important in the conduct of the defense.

In general, a negative signal,

which tells partner not to lead a particular suit without telling him which one to lead, is not as illuminating as a positive signal, which sends a more specific message. However, a combination of negative signals can, together, add up to a positive signal, as illustrated in the accompanying hand.

West leads the jack of spades, dummy winning with the king as East follows suit with the deuce. Declarer plays a low club to the king, followed by the ten and then a third club, which West now takes with the ace.

East has to discard on the last club, and his play is highly important to the defense. If he signals with the nine or ten of hearts in order to direct a heart lead, the play costs him the contract even though West shifts to a heart. Declarer's eight eventually proves to be a heart stopper and he makes three no-trumps.

But if East discards the deuce of diamonds on the third club, the defense triumphs if West leads a heart; in fact, South goes down two.

A heart play by West at this point is not really difficult. When East denies strength in spades and diamonds by playing low in those suits, he is inferentially signalling for hearts. All that West has to do is obey the signal.
