The Markets.

Potatoes are coming in a little livelier than the date of our last report, and the price have gone up to from 43 to 44. The street price of oats is 54c, and hay is selling at from 75 to 80c. Eggs are slow at from 7 to 8c.

Flouring are Chicago quotations for the 28th July wheat opened at \$1.06 5/8 and closed at \$1.07 1/2; July pork opened at \$12 87 and closed at \$12 97 1/2. Sept. wheat opened at \$1.15 and closed at \$1.01 1/2; Sept. pork opened at \$13 25 and closed at \$13 35.

In pronto on the 25th, provisions and hogs were in good demand, and prices were steadily maintained on all cuts. Dressed hogs were scarce and firm. The packers got very few, all offered being taken by butchers; figures above what packers would pay. Canadian mess pork brought from \$15 to \$16.00; bacon, long clear, per lb. 8c; lard, Canada, tubs and pails, 9 to 9 1/2; smoked meats—hams, per lb. 11 to 11 1/2; bellies, per lb. 11c; rolls, per lb. 9c; backs, per lb. 10c. The quotations for produce on the same date were as follows: Potatoes, per bag, \$1.15 to \$1.25; do, do on track, \$1 to \$1.05; dried apples, 8 1/2 to 9 1/2; evaporated do, 12 to 14c; eggs, fresh, 11 1/2 to 12c; hay, \$9 50 to \$10 for timothy, \$8 to \$9 for mixed; straw, \$6 50 to \$7; sheepskins, \$1 to \$1.50; pelts, 6 to 8c; hides, green, No. 1, 5 to 6c; wool, 18 to 19c; chickens, 75 to 90c; ducks, 50c to \$1; turkeys, per lb. 14 to 16c; geese, per lb. 8c; onions, per bbl. \$4 to \$4 50; seeds, prime, to choice, alsike, \$7 to \$8 50; ad, \$4.50 to \$5; timothy, \$1.20 to \$1.65; maple syrup, per gal. 90 to 95c; maple sugar, 8 to 9c. The flour market was dull, and the following are the car prices: Manitoba patent, \$6 25; Manitoba, strong bakers, \$6; Ont. no. 1 patent, \$5 30 to \$5 50; straight roller, \$5 to \$5 10; extra, \$4.75 to \$4.80; low grades, \$3 to \$4 50.

In Montreal on the same date, the flour market was stagnant and prices were unchanged. There was also little or no change in h.g. products. Eggs were steady at 11 1/2 to 12c, choice lots bringing the latter figure.

Horse Notes.

Among the horses that have attracted a great deal of attention in this Province during the past year, both for their individual excellence and the superiority of their stock, Physician, 7349, takes a prominent position. We need not describe this handsome and shapely horse, as his rich color, his grand conformation, his high quality and substance, his splendid limbs and feet, and his stylish and elegant finish are quite familiar to all who have seen him, either in his stable, at exercise, or at the Provincial Exhibition at Charlottetown last fall, where he added to former triumphs by again winning first prize in his class, over a fine field of trotting stallions. His blood lines are good, he having a double infusion of the blood of Abdullah, 1, through both his sire and dam, his sire, Edward Everett, 81, being by Hambletonian, 10, son of Abdullah, 1, and his second dam being a daughter of the same famous sire. Of Abdullah, 1, and Hambletonian 10, we need say nothing, as every horseman is familiar with their history and the position they occupied in the equine world. Edward Everett, Physician's sire, was one of the best sons of Hambletonian, 10, being the sire of Judge Fullerton, 218, and twelve others in the 230 list, while nine of his sons have twenty-one performers, and seven of his daughters have nine trotters in the same list. Thus it will be seen that Edward Everett's sons and daughters are breeding on. Last year his son Macey's Hambletonian, or Thomas K. 1582, was purchased by a syndicate and taken to Europe for stock purposes. At the same time Boscue Bonita, 226 1/2 at three years old, was purchased by the same syndicate, taken to Europe and placed on the turf. At Vienna, on Oct. 24, 1890, she won the tree-for-all, in which the purse was \$2,500, in straight heats over a splendid field of native and imported trotters, making a record of 2:19 1/4, and becoming the champion trotter of Europe, no small honor for the family from which Physician comes. Then Dolly Varden, Physician's dam, is not only a beautiful animal individually, but is a producing mare, being the dam of his full brother Eclipse, 225, and Doctor Syntax, 230. Back of the noble strains above noted are copious infusions of the thoroughbred blood that is found in many trotting pedigrees, including that of Bay Middleton, sire of old Saladin, a horse famed in the equine history of Prince Edward Island, and whose blood is still much prized by many Island breeders. With such breeding as this, and with this magnificent individuality to back it up, breeders need not hesitate to patronize Physician, especially as the superiority of his stock is proof of his propinquity. They are a fine looking lot, endowed with the size, style and finish of their sire, and, if we can judge by their action and gait at their present early age, with the speed of the lines from which he is descended. We wish the owner of Physician, Mr. Geo. E. Hughes, of Apothecaries Hall, every success with his handsome and well-bred horse.

The Horseman, commenting upon the fact that a Canadian trotting circuit which includes eight towns has been formed and the first meeting will be given on May 24, says: "The Canucks have made giant strides in the matter of trotting during the last few years; and more than that, they have gone into the breeding of trotters with a great amount of enthusiasm, a large number of well-bred stallions having been taken from this country to Canada during the last five years. As a rule, the trouble with trotting in Canada has been that the management of the tracks did not properly enforce the rules, but now that good men are taking hold of the sport and are also interesting themselves in breeding light-harness horses there will be little trouble on that score, as these same men will for their own protection gradually take control of the managements of the trotting tracks just as the breeders of this country have done, and before long we shall have big purses and plenty of trotting meetings in Canada every summer."

While she and Mr. Ephraim Lefurgey were driving down Central Street about six in the evening, a dog ran out and attacked Mr. Lefurgey's dog, and a fight ensued underneath the carriage. Mr. Lefurgey then got out to separate the dogs, when the horse took fright and started on the full gallop down the street. In the jolting over the crossings Mrs. Brennan was thrown forward on the shafts, and here she was able to cling on until the horse bolted into Goullie's yard, at the back of his drug store. We understand Mrs. Brennan is but little the worse comparatively, and it seems almost miraculous that she escaped so well.

An expedition is to start about the first of May to explore Greenland. It will consist of Lieut. R. E. Perry, civil engineer of the United States navy, and four or five picked men, who will take supplies for two years. This will be Mr. Perry's second attempt to solve the mystery of Greenland. His voyage in arctic regions in 1886 with a single companion is regarded as one of the most successful on record.
