NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP)—For the first time since mid-August an unbroken curtain of water rushed over Niagara's Horseshoe Falls Monday. U.S. Army engineers have removed most of a big diversion dike upstream from the falls to let the Niagara river roar unhindered over the crestline. The engineers are engaged in a mammoth erosion control and beautification project at the falls. Before they began work last spring, water on the American side of the Horseshoe Falls trickled over in some spots and gushed over in others. After the diversion dike was built, about one-third of the crestline was dry while construction men dug new channels upstream from the falls.
