Largest Enrollment In History Of St. Dunstan's

Total enrollment at St. Dunstan's University reached an all-time high yesterday when the four hundredth student was accepted at the century-old Roman Catholic institution situated on the Malpeque Road, two miles from the city proper. This increase in registrations continued a trend which first appeared at the commencement of the 1954-55 academic year stated Rev. Edmund Roche, University Registrar. That year 320 students were accepted in the various faculties, followed by 327 the next year, and 386 last year.

Since Grade X, which had an enrollment last year of 34, was no longer offered by the College High School, this year's record enrollment indicated an actual increase of 48 students in the higher levels, Father Roche explained.

FROM HONG KONG

During the summer applications for admission had been received from almost every section of the Dominion, from the United States, Mexico, and a number of other foreign countries—a total of 96 qualified applicants sought admission from the city of Hong Kong alone. Referring to the large number of applicants from the British-owned colony in China, the Registrar said that it had been possible to accept only four, though the other 92 were fully qualified to enter University work. This addition brought to eight the number of Hong Kong students enrolled at S.D.U. he added.

Every Province in Canada is represented in this year's student body Father Roche stated, with the exception of British Columbia. Newfoundland, with 48 native sons registered in various faculties has the largest representation of any area outside P.E.I. "Registrations show a reasonable balance among the various faculties," the College Registrar stated, noting that there were 99 registered in Freshman year, 85 in Sophomore year, and 40 in Junior year. 84th Presbyterian Synod Will Meet At Zion Church

NEW GLASGOW, N.S.: The eighty-fourth annual meeting of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be held in Zion Church, Charlottetown, P.E.I. commencing on Tuesday evening, October 1st.

The Synod which is composed of all the ministers on the Rolls of the Presbyteries together with a representative elder from each Pastoral Charge will be opened with Public Worship conducted by the Moderator, the Rev. Donald A. Campbell who will preach. Mr. Campbell, a native of Prince Edward Island is minister

at Montague, P.E.I. He was elected Moderator last October when the Synod met in First Church, Pictou, N.S., where he was formerly minister. The new Moderator of Synod will be elected shortly after the Court is constituted.

The Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, D.D., of Little Narrows, Cape Breton is a member of the Synod which was honoured by his election at Vancouver in June, the first Maritime minister to be so honoured in a score of years, the last being the Rev. Dr. Hugh Munroe, late of New Glasgow, N.S. who was Moderator in 1937. Dr. MacKinnon is expected to address the public meeting of Synod on Wednesday evening, Oct. 2.

During the convention sessions, the denominations 1958 educational, home and foreign missions and literature departments programs were unveiled.

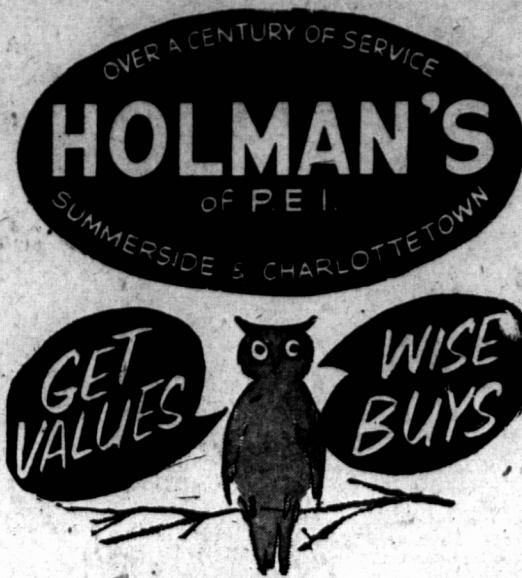
