**Springfield Team
Refuses To Play**

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP)—The entire squad of Springfield Indians of the American Hockey League walked out Monday on owner Eddie Shore.

The 23 players took the action in protest of suspensions handed three defencemen Sunday by Shore.

Shore issued a statement saying he refused "to be dictated to by the group" and that the players had "automatically broken their contracts with their refusal to practice."

He said he was not worried about whether the team would return to practice today.

"It's up to them. I'll bring in enough players to man two more clubs if I need to in order to meet our schedule requirements."

Suspended were Dale Rolfe, Bill White and Dave Amadio, considered to be the club's top defencemen. They were suspended for what Shore called "indifferent play."

Shore's action followed Springfield's fourth straight loss — 4-1 to Quebec Saturday in a game decided late in the third period.

DEMANDED MEETING
The players demanded a meeting with Shore before a scheduled noon practice Monday. The squad, except for the three suspended players, had drilled for an hour at 8:30 a.m.

When informed by coach Harry Pridmore that Shore wouldn't see them, the Indians walked out, refusing to practice as scheduled in the afternoon.

The Indians are scheduled to play Providence Reds in Springfield Friday and in Providence Sunday.

A spokesman for the players said they have agreed to remain away indefinitely unless an agreement over Shore's suspensions of players can be reached.

Larry Johnston, another defenceman, was suspended by Shore for a week a short time ago, but returned to the lineup Saturday night.

The Indians started the season by winning five and tying one in their first six games. Since then they have managed only a 4-13-2 mark with frequent lineup changes during the period.

**Horses Not To
Go To Olympics**

ROME (AP)—The International Equestrian Federation has decided to hold the three-day equestrian event of the 1968 Mexico Olympics outside Mexico City because of the possible effects of the high altitude on horses.

The federation met in camera last week. It decided the events would be held at Oaxtepec which is at an altitude of about 4,500 feet.

An Italian Equestrian Federation official said the request to hold the events at Oaxtepec was made by Eduardo Baz, secretary of the Mexican Equestrian Federation.

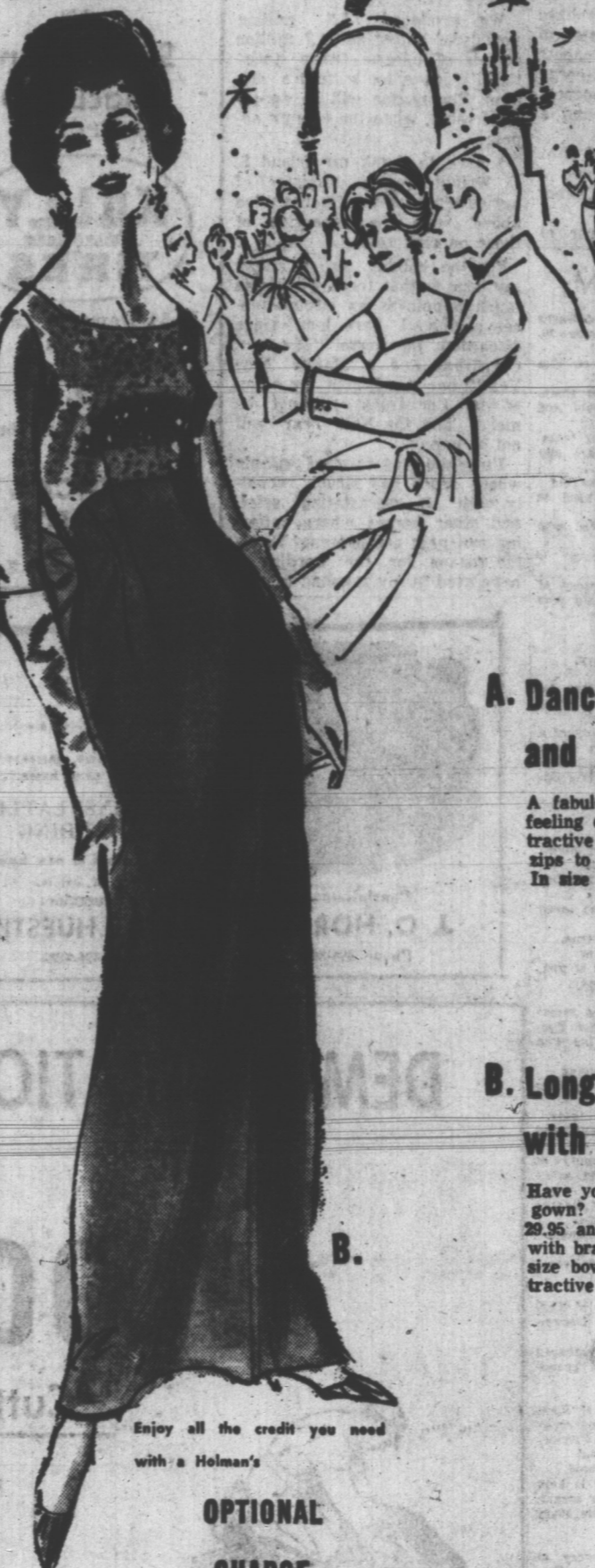
The International Federation decided that the horse jumping event, which usually closes the Olympic Games, would be held at the Mexico City Olympic Stadium as scheduled.
