## 2 Boys, Girl Trapped In 55 Feet of Water

A three-hour attempt to save the lives of three young adults ended in failure here last night after their car plunged off the side of the government wharf and into 55 feet of water.

THIS IS THE government wharf at Souris where last night's drowning tragedy took place. This picture was taken in the afternoon, as a large crowd watched the fishermen's races. The scene of the accident was the corner of the wharf not visible in the right side of this picture. However,

it is similar to the one shown here. The water is 20 to 25 feet deep. A concrete fender some 12 inches high and 5 to 10 inches wide is said to project the edge of the wharf.

At this time, Prime Minister Diefenbaker said the suspension would be in effect for 90 days, pending the report of the MacPheerson royal commission on transportation.

## Increase In Grain Rates Is Postponed To Dec. 31

OTTAWA (CP)—The cabinet has again suspended an authorized increase in railway freight rates on bulk grain shipments to the east coast.

By order-in-council, the cabinet directed the Board of Transport Commissioners to extend the suspension of the rate increase to end Dec. 31. The board announced the step Wednesday.

The government first intervened in March, 1961, forcing a 90-day suspension in the rate increase.

### Bennett Blamed For Dollar Crisis

CORNWALL (CP)—Trade and Commerce Minister Hees Wednesday again suspended an authorized increase in railway freight rates on bulk grain shipments to the east coast.

It was the fourth cabinet-ordered postponement in the rate case—of the five categories in the freight rate structure not frozen by the government's gesture on a railway rate increase.

## Non-Ops Declare Benefits Would Be Small Rail Cost

MONTREAL (CP)—The revolutionary job security plan sought by Canada's 100,000 non-operating railway employees would add only two per cent to railway labor costs by 1973 if it is implemented at once, a federal consultation board was told Wednesday.

The outline of what the 15 C.I.O.-affiliated unions that bargain for the non-ops estimate the effects of their far-reaching plan was the highlight in the presentation of more than 20 pages of arguments by Frank Hall, veteran chief negotiator for the unions.

Key recommendation, aimed at freeing the railways for all-out competition against truck-calls for a wide-open freight rate structure, except for export grain carried at statutory rates.

### British Require Car Seat Belts
