U.S. Senator Denounces Both Rusk And McNamara

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Wayne Morse (Dem. Ore.) denounced State Secretary Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara in the U.S. Senate Monday and said both "should have been removed months ago."

Morse, attacking U.S. policy in Viet Nam as "immoral and godless," accused spokesmen for the Johnson administration of employing "sneaky tactics" against him and other critics of the policy. Morse took issue with what he said was McNamara's assertion he did not believe Russia and China would enter the war.

"He's been so irresponsibly wrong, any prediction he makes should be discounted and discredited," Morse said. "McNamara and Rusk along with him," Morse said, "should have been removed months ago."

LBJ's Pearson Reaction Referred To In Magazines

WASHINGTON (CP) — Three United States weekly magazines this week refer to President Johnson's reaction to the suggestion in an April 2 speech at Philadelphia that the United States "pause" in its bombing of North Viet Nam.

Time, in listing foreign leaders who have called on the president this year, include Pearson's name and says he "annoyed the president during his U.S. visit by making a casual speech about the Johnson administration's policy toward Viet Nam."

U.S. News and World Report, also a news magazine, says in its lead story the president "has not been pleased by the attitude or actions of Lester Pearson, prime minister of Canada fully dependent on the U.S. for its defence."

Opening lead — king of spades. Defense against suit contracts take many forms, but one of the most frequent methods of attack is to try to run declarer out of trumps. If the declarer can accomplish this, they may then be able to cash all their remaining high cards or run a long suit.

When the ratio of trumps held is eight on the declarer's side to five on the defender's side, the tug of war with trumps is often spirited. Usually, the declarer just about lasts, but sometimes his trumps don't hold out.

If declarer has more than eight trumps, the issue is usually decided elsewhere, the battle being mostly between high cards.

When declarer has less than eight trumps to work with, he will generally have his hands full trying to overcome the trump deficiency.

South failed in today's hand because his trumps, impressive though they were from the standpoint of quality, proved to be inadequate in length. The four heart contract was sound, and would have been made with a normal 3-2 trump division, but with West having four trumps, South could not quite manage the affair.

The defense started with three rounds of spades and South had to ruff the third one. When he then led the king of hearts, West refused to take the ace. When South continued with the queen, West wisely ducked again.

Declarer was unable to prevail against this defense. West by now had the A-7 of trumps left. South the J-10, and dummy the nine.

South could not afford another trump lead because West would win the trick with the ace, play a spade to force out declarer's last trump, and thus defeat the contract two tricks.

So declarer abandoned further trump plays and started to run the clubs. West ruffed the third club with the seven, cashed the ace of trumps, and South thus held the loss to down one.

The magazine links this with the postponement by Johnson last week of visits from the leaders of India and Pakistan on grounds of domestic pressures and Viet Nam. Both countries have repeated Pearson's suggestion for a pause in bombing of Communist North Viet Nam "at the right time" to encourage peace talks.

The New Republic, a magazine of opinion, comments on Johnson's apparent sensitivity to criticism on domestic issues and says "one assumes that his reaction to criticism does not carry over into foreign affairs."

It adds: "and yet one wonders if the U.S. has no better friend than Canada's Lester Pearson and yet there were signs he had affronted Mr. Johnson by his modest proposal for a temporary cease-fire in Viet Nam."

New Republic says there were hints Johnson also took "amiss" original peace proposals made earlier by Secretary-general U Thant of the United Nations.

There had been published reports earlier in the U.S. the president was not happy about the Pearson speech when the two men met last day for lunch at Camp David, MD.

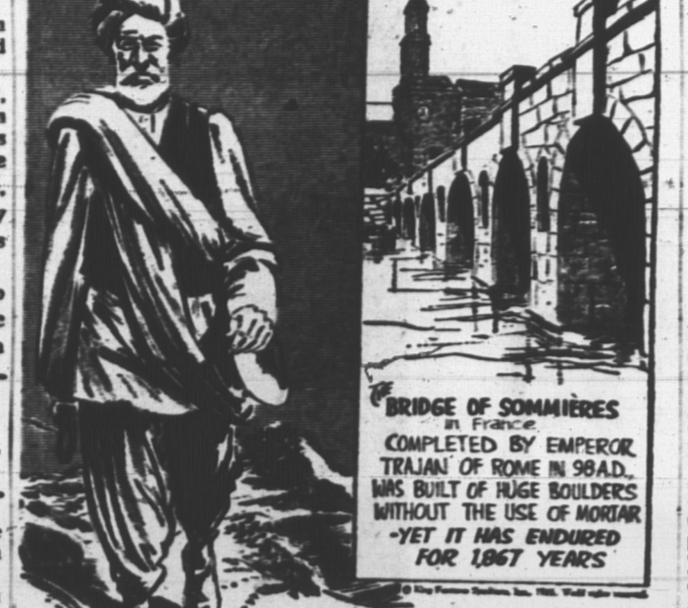
Last Thursday in an Ottawa press conference, Pearson said they had had an "argument" but parted good friends. He did not say what they argued about.
