The Irish Procession.—The National Attitude.

One of the most impressive features of the procession on Tuesday last, at the unveiling of the O'Connell monument, was a long line of Catholic religious confraternities. The Land League was not directly represented, but fourteen Irish members of Parliament were present, including Parnell, Sexton, O'Connor, Dillon, Redmond, Biggar and Davitt.

Prominent features were the handles of a large number of banners, designed as pike-heads, gilded. Over the name on the door of the Land League offices was the motto "It will rise again." In front of the house was a red banner with white crescent and three stars, bearing the word "Arabi."

Fourteen hundred carmen, riding the horses they ordinarily drive, advancing four deep, presented a very soldierly appearance. To-day the freedom of Dublin will be presented to Messrs. Farnell and Dillon.

MR. BLAIN, in his recent letter, hinted that the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie had been forced to shoulder the financial burdens of the Liberal party. It is now stated that it was for some thousands of dollars worth of campaign literature, printed by the Globe in 1876, for which, when the Globe pressed for payment, Mr. Mackenzie gave his note, which was discounted and has been several times renewed, but never paid.

At Truro, on Saturday evening, Wesley Smith was dressing in his bedroom for his wedding, which was to take place that night. He went to sit down on the window sill, and the window being open, lost his balance, fell out on the street, and severely, perhaps fatally injured his back.

The tidings from the Northwest are particularly joyous. The crops in Manitoba and the regions beyond are described in the one word splendid. The prospect, it seems, has been marred by no whirlwinds, no drought, no deluges, no bligs, no worms, no flies, no hoppers.
