

Rule 1.—That an Institution be forthwith established, and designated The Roman Catholic Provident, Benevolent and Total Abstinence Society of Charlottetown, the operative existence of which is to cement an affectionate feeling of good will and brotherly love amongst us; also, to render pecuniary relief to such of the pledged members of the Roman Catholic Abstinence Society of this Island as may be deemed worthy of the same, and to render assistance to such Emigrants as may hereafter arrive in this Colony, being members of an Abstinence Society established elsewhere.

2. That no person shall be admitted members of this Society, so as to participate in its government or benefits, except such persons as are the enrolled members of the Roman Catholic Abstinence Society of this Island, and in accordance with its Rules, totally abstain from the use of all intoxicating drinks, duly pay into the funds of this institution the required quarterly subscription, and yield due obedience to its Rules.

3. That this Society shall be governed by a President, two Assistant Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and a Committee of twelve Members. The President, or, in his absence, either of the Assistant Presidents, is to preside at such meetings (and enforce due order therein) as shall be held by this institution, and sign such written documents as may be drawn on the Treasurer for any outlay of the funds of this institution. The Treasurer to receive and account for all moneys paid into the institution; and also for all payments made for and on account of the same, any portion of which funds he shall not pay or expend without first receiving an order to that effect, signed by the President or his Assistants, and a majority of the other officers of the Committee. The Committee is to be elected from amongst the enrolled members of this institution annually, by ballot, on every Easter Monday, successively, at which time the accounts of the institution are to be finally arranged. The Secretary shall attend at all the meetings of this Society, and record the proceedings thereof in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall duly notify the officers and members, by order of the President or his Assistants, when such meetings are held, by public advertisement in the Newspapers, or otherwise—the said officer-bearers to be ex-officio members of the Committee, which is hereby authorised to enforce all fines and penalties on the members of this institution, seven of whom, with the President or Assistant President, shall constitute a quorum.

4. That no person or persons shall receive any pecuniary relief, out of the funds of this institution, except such as are enrolled members thereof twelve months prior to such application, except such pledged abstinence Emigrants as may hereafter arrive in this Colony.

That each member of this institution shall pay annually the sum of Three Shillings, in quarterly payments, viz:—In April, July, October and January, at which periods the quarterly meetings of this Society shall be held, and of which due notice shall be given; and on the omission of the members of this Society to attend the said quarterly meetings, such fines will be imposed on the said absentees, unless satisfactory cause can be shewn, as the officers may deem fit—all such fines to go to the funds of the institution. That if any member of this institution, or Emigrant as aforesaid, is visited with sickness, or other affliction, a due regard shall be paid towards the relief of his or her pecuniary wants; and if a resident of Charlottetown or Royalty, and visited by death, the whole of the members residing within the said Town and its confines, shall be apprised of such death, and be requested to attend the funeral of the deceased in an orderly manner; and on neglecting so to do, such fines shall be imposed by the officers as they deem meet, unless good cause can be shewn for the non-attendance of all such members.

5. That the officers of this institution are hereby authorised to expend the funds of the same in the relief of its indigent members, and in the disbursement of such essentials as may be deemed requisite for its well being. That an annual festival shall be duly set apart and strictly observed, successively, commemorative of the institution, and the origin of the Roman Catholic Abstinence Society of this Island; and that such festival shall be celebrated on each Easter Monday, annually, in such way and manner as the officers shall decide on, and which decision shall be made known by advertisement eight days prior to each festival.

6. That if any of the enrolled members of this institution shall omit to pay their annual subscription, on demand thereof being made by the Secretary, such member shall forfeit his membership and all future claims to this Society.

7. That donations and subscriptions shall be received and acknowledged in aid of the funds of this institution from the benevolently disposed, and that an annual subscription of Five Shillings, or upwards, will constitute the donor an Honorary Member of the Institution, but will not entitle such person to interfere in its government; and that no alteration be made in the foregoing constitution, except the same be done by and with the consent of the members of this Society, at its annual meeting.

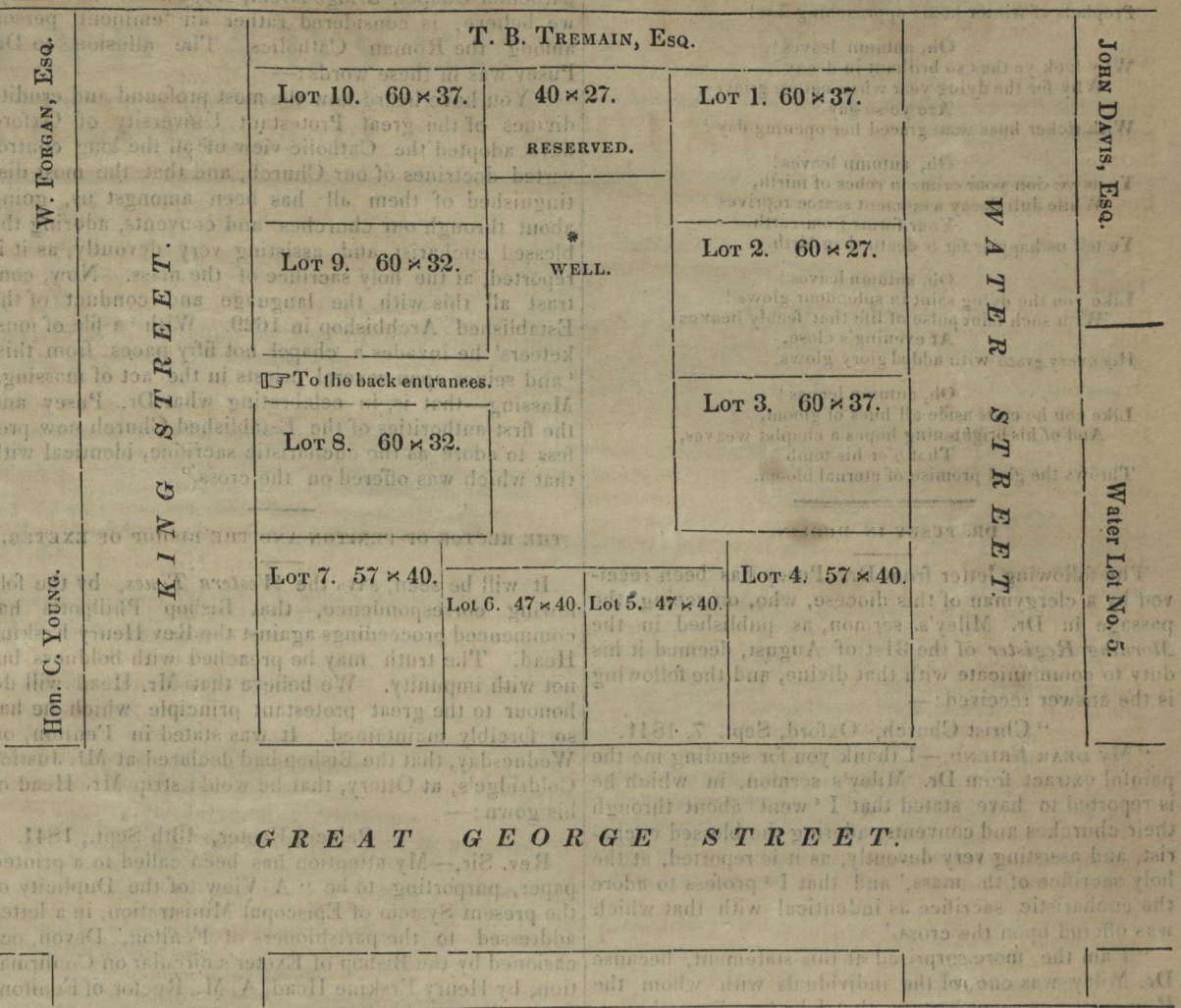
