AT THE Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Charles Waller was fined \$1 and costs or four days' imprisonment for being drunk and incapable.

THE races at Sunnyside Driving Park, comes off on Thursday, commencing at eleven o'clock. Charlottetown will be well represented by Mr. A. N. Large's stallion "Bush Messenger," and Mr. Fredk White's mare "Tib."

ONTARIO is emphatically the Province of shows and fairs and exhibitions. Big and little, there was, or will be, one fair or show or exhibition to every 15,000 of the people of that province. That suggests life, vigor, energy, good feeling.—*Her Reporter.*

THE potato crop of New Brunswick will be very large this year, and an attempt is to be made to open up a trade with the old country. The brig "Laura B." has been chartered to take a full cargo to Liverpool. This will be the first large shipment. A small lot of 21 barrels went forward in the ship "Hospodar" last week.

THE "Maritime Journal" places the value of the fisheries at Grand Manan at \$500,000 annually. It further says that the hake sounds and livers are alone a source of considerable revenue, the sounds alone last year selling at North Head at from \$30,000 to \$40,000.

ADVICES from the west coast of Africa state that Stanley evidently intends to complete the exploration of the Congo river from the west coast at Sierra Leon. His steamer was in danger of being stripped by the authorities, and Stanley had to declare himself, although he was travelling under an assumed name.

A LETTER in the Mail says it was darkly hinted that the attempt to capture Hon. George Brown, in the kidnappers' case, was hatched by the U. E. Club, but a rather different one is entertained by more reflective minds, viz., that it was an effort of some real friends of the grit party to get rid of the chief, and chief cause of the party's present forlorn position.

THE pedestrian contest at Madison Square, New York, resulted in a victory for Rowell, "The little Englishman." At the end of the contest he scored 530 miles; Merritt, 515; Hazael, 500; Hart, 482; Guyon, 471; Weston, 465; Ennis, 450; Krohne, 450; Taylor, 250. Weston challenged Rowell at the close of the contest. Merritt will go to England to engage in the next match.

THE LATE PRINCE IMPERIAL.—Mr. Barry, appointed by the French-Canadian young men to present the wealth of immortelles destined for the tomb of the late Prince Imperial, has performed his task. He was graciously received by the Empress Eugenie, who declared it was the handsomest of the many that had been presented. It was immediately placed in the mortuary chapel. Mr. Barry was the only gentleman received since the Prince's death, with the exception of the Captain of the "Orontes," who brought the body home.

WILLIAM MCKINNON, Michael Burns and Edward O'Neill, were further examined at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, on a charge of burglary. Mrs. Henderson was examined, and testified that the prisoner, O'Neill, slept at her house (which is ten miles from the city) on the night the burglary was committed, and that he left for the city on Sunday morning, after helping her to milk the cows. Wm. McKinnon and Michael Burns were fully committed for trial in the Supreme Court, on a charge of burglary; and O'Neill was committed for trial in the same Court for receiving stolen goods.

A DAUGHTER of Mr. John McLearn, Clyde River, had a very narrow escape from death on Friday night last. On that night about nine o'clock she went to a well near her father's residence to draw a bucket of water. By some mishap she fell headlong into the well, which is sixty feet deep. While rapidly falling she grasped the draw-rope but could not hold on, and she continued her terrible descent and sank in seven feet of water. She rose to the surface again, grasped the draw-rope, hung to it during the night, and thus saved herself from drowning. Early on Saturday morning she was discovered, and released from her perilous position. Her injuries are, we are pleased to learn, not very serious. Her head was severely cut by striking against the side of the wall, and her body was badly shaken by the fall. She is now going well.
