SIR JOHN MACDONALD LAST HOURS.

OTTAWA, June 5 (4 p. m.) A bulletin issued by four doctors, including Dr. Ross, of Montreal, says that Sir John is in an alarming state. His strength has been gradually failing during the week. It shows a marked decline since yesterday. There is still a slight flickering of consciousness. Respiration, 38; pulse, 120, more irregular than before. His hours of life are steadily waning.

OTTAWA, June 6 (10.35.) Just waiting for death, which may occur at any moment. Sir John is unconscious and takes no nourishment.

OTTAWA, June 6-1 p. m. The doctors, after consultation, say that Sir John is rapidly sinking, but may last till four o'clock.

Very few men have been more intimate with Sir John Macdonald for a great many years than Dr. Sullivan, the Senator from Kingston. Frequently when visiting that city he stayed at Senator Sullivan's house on Princess street, and when triumphantly returned at the polls in 1872 and 1873 it was from the grounds in front of his house that Sir John addressed the crowd, beginning as he almost invariably did with: "Fellow electors, once more I have been returned for the city of Kingston," spoken with a rising inflection. When the Premier was taken ill at Kingston during the recent campaign, Dr. Sullivan attended him. As a result of that examination Dr. Sullivan stated to-day that he was satisfied the Premier had up to the last no organic disease. He had not even what is known technically as atheroma, a disease which commonly occurs in the blood vessels of elderly people, and which renders the patient liable to paralysis and apoplexy and other affections. He made a peculiar discovery. Sir John's left pulse was feebler on one side than on the other. This caused the doctor some alarm, but the Premier told him Sir Charles Tupper had noticed it ten years ago. Senator Sullivan remembers Sir John Macdonald's mother, who was he says, a very superior woman. It is from her he believes the Premier got his talents. She had paralysis and died many years ago. Miss Macdonald, his sister, who is also dead, was during her lifetime attended by Dr. Sullivan. She had symptoms just like those in the present case. He heart was weak and she feared paralysis because her mother had been seized with it. She was given up on eight or ten different occasions by the doctors, but lived to a ripe old age. The whole family had extraordinary vitality and recuperative powers, and were wonderfully relieved by rest. He never knew anyone whom rest would repair so quickly as members of this family.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT. Sir Charles Not Censured. Another Vote—Majority 31.

OTTAWA, June 6. In the House of Commons yesterday, the Privileges and Elections Committee reported the refusal of Michael Connolly to surrender books of account to the Committee. He was summoned to appear before the bar of the House on Monday next. The debate upon Laurier's motion of censure against the High Commissioner was continued, and lasted till one o'clock this morning, when it was defeated by a vote of 100 to 79. Nineteen members of the Government were paired and eight unpaired. The House then went into Committee of Supply, and adjourned at 1.30.

NEWFOUNDLAND. AN AGREEMENT AT LAST.

LONDON, June 6. The Newfoundland delegates have arrived at a satisfactory agreement with the Imperial Government, for a permanent Act to replace the three years' measure recently passed by the Local Legislature.

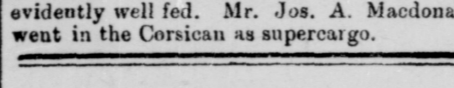
