

# Sons Of Temperance Open Convention At Summerside

The 108th annual session of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, national division, was officially opened yesterday morning in Epworth Hall, Summerside with well-coming addresses to the one hundred and twenty five delegates by the Hon. J.G. MacKay, Minister of Highways, representing the Premier, who is out of the Province and Mayor W.A. Currie. The convention is being attended by delegates of the U.S.A. including Florida, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, New Jersey and Massachusetts. The presiding officers is M. W. Patriarch H. Nickerson of Halifax.

Mr. W.E. Gatenby, head of over 100,000 members of the organization in Great Britain was guest speaker at last evening's lobster banquet, during which he gave a very straightforward talk on the pub system in England, showing its harmful effects on the life of the nation by encouraging drinking and the resultant economic effects. Mrs. Gatenby stressed the benefit system which the temperance organization maintains in Great Britain which is recognized as one of the leading friendly societies of the nation through its many social benefits.

During the course of Mr. Gatenby's official reception he presented an illuminated address from his organization in Great Britain to the national division and a presentation to Mrs. Gatenby was made by Miss Elsie Judd of Philadelphia during last evening's banquet. The banquet was presided over by Rev. W.H. Forsyth, Grand Worthy Patriarch who also presided at a reception on Tuesday evening at which time he extended a welcome on behalf of the local members. The highlight of last evening's entertainment was a number of readings by young Mike Yodes from Tavares, Florida who is a member of the Juvenile organization there.

On Tuesday evening the initial group of candidates for initiation at Wilmot Valley and Cape Wolfe were received into the Excelsior Division.

Among those taking part in the session are Rev. Dr. J.L. Reynolds and Eric Tibbo, officials of the order in Newfoundland, also Rev. Dr. C.H. Johnston, St. John, Rev. Edward Morrison, Halifax and Rev. R.R. Winchester, Digby, N.S.

Today the biennial election of officers will be held as well as the annual memorial service for deceased members.

In Westmorland County, N. B. where the land assessment was comparable with that of Prince Edward Island, the average tax paid by ratepayers is \$185 per year compared to the average of \$35 on the Island.

"How can we expect our children to get a proper education if they are obliged to receive instruction from a young teen age girl who perhaps herself has failed academically," he asked. "Our best brains is leaving the Province each year and such a system can result in nothing more than a deterioration of our educational standards."

Mr. Parker expressed satisfaction with the stand the Women's Institutes of the Province have taken in regard to educational matters. He felt that "a live organization" such as this could do much to bring about an improvement.

The subject of the panel discussion was "Can Farm Income Be Improved?" Mr. Dewar said that with the shortage of farm labour and the high cost of farm machinery, many were of the opinion that the take home pay of the farmer could meet operating costs.

Mr. Proffitt said it was a very great problem—that of increasing farm revenue. Farming today, he said, resolved itself into two categories: either you buy a lot of machinery to keep up production or you stick to the family farm and try to get long as economically as possible. In either case the farmer is usually in financial difficulties.

Mr. Parent thought that by giving closer attention to farm management and to the little things a great deal could be saved. "The size of the farm," he said "was not so important as the way the items such as preservation of the barnyard manure, the control of weeds and the extermination of pests."

SOMETHING WRONG  
Mr. Clay said, "Some people say we have no problem of production—we are producing more than we can sell." He went on to point out that 40 per cent of all the little pigs born in Canada die before they are ready for market. He also said that \$100.00 was lost in this Province by farmers selling hogs that were over weight.

He went further to state that 80 per cent of the cattle shipped from this province were not fit for beef. One Maritime plant alone in one week made 70 tons of bologna.

Another point emphasized by Mr. Clay was the fact that the average production of grain on the Island is 30 bu per acre. "If this were increased to 50 bushels per acre we would be independent of western grain," he said.

Mr. Clay felt it was inevitable that farms will get bigger. "If the 75 acre farm is to remain then we can only expect that we will have a form of peasantry which exists in some of the European countries of today or like it was here 50 years ago."

**FERTILIZER COSTS**  
Mr. Parent said that fertilizer cost island farmers \$2,000,000 a year. He felt that a great deal of this could be saved for bedding and would supply much of the nitrogen and potash which is required and which incidentally are the most costly fertilizers. He felt that waste and inefficiency was the cause of the trouble in some instances.

Mr. Proffitt said a farmer may produce the most butterfat possible and he may market all grade A hogs but he still hasn't enough money to go round. "How can he farm efficiently if he can't afford it," he asked.

ber of years but felt that the improvement had not been enough for the amount of promotional work and money spent for that purpose.

**NEW SCHEME**  
Mr. Cullen said a new scheme is being worked out by the Department of Agriculture whereby it would be more profitable for farmers within certain geographical boundaries to keep the same breed of bull.

He urged farmers, when purchasing herd sires to try to obtain the very best. He said that in certain instances a herd sire has been able to raise the procreation of the herd by 100 per cent. This, he said should be the goal for which they should aim. He cautioned against breeding fads which in many instances have had the effect of producing smaller animals.

Mr. Fred Cannon of the Science Service Laboratory gave a brief description of a number of potato and turnip pests and the methods of control which have found to be effective.

When asked whether aldrin or heptachlor could be mixed with fertilizer he said his department had found no results from this method of application and could not therefore recommend it.
