Fine Needlework Display By Notre Dame Students

A solid grounding in the home arts is shown in the work of pupils at Notre Dame Academy now on display in the new auditorium there. From the first surprisingly careful efforts of the tiny tots in Grade 1 to the equally surprising tailored dresses turned out by senior pupils very little of the art of sewing and needlework in general is missed.

On the other side of the home economics picture is a long table of edible delicacies so tempting as to inspire poetry rather than descriptive prose. Cookies, cakes, pies, candies, pickles, relishes, jams, doughnuts all vie for the award of good eating. In addition the girls of Grade 7 are taught to prepare and serve breakfasts while in Grade 8 they learn to prepare complete supper menus.

The 4H Sewing Club of senior girls has approximately 120 pupils with a complete display of work that ranges far into advanced needlework. Shown is a vast array of teenage finery from plaid skirts to semi-formal dresses with a wide variety of useful items from aprons to jackets in between. Clothing to fit tiny tots is not forgotten, nor is the comfort of the home as shown in the large number of fancy pillows made by the girls.

In the home economics group of girls from Grades 7, 8, 9 and 10 there are 111 pupils working together to learn the art of feeding themselves and other people. Their cooking is obviously of top quality from light biscuits to flaky pie crust and their pickling efforts are outstanding.

Heading the teaching staff for the two groups are Sister St. Cecilia and Sister St. Peter who kindly and Sister St. Peter who kindly took the Guardian representatives around and explained the work being done by each group and each grade.
