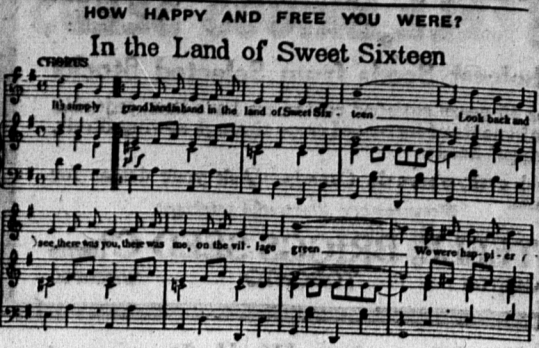

Much interest has been aroused in antiquarian circles by the declaration by Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn, leader of American paleontology, of his belief that the first certain evidence of the existence of man in the tertiary geological epoch is that which was found at Foxhall, near Ipswich, by Mr. Reid Moir thirteen years ago. It may be explained that the tertiary was an early period in the history of geology more than 100,000 years ago and was characterized by the rapid increasing development of a land fauna and flora and the up-lifting of the great mountain-chains of the globe. The Foxhall pit contained human fossil remains and those of mammals associated with a warm climate and beaked flints believed to be the work of a primitive human type.

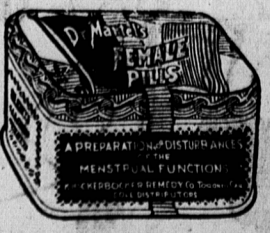
