P. E. I. Pointed To With Pride By Nat. B & P Womens' Clubs

TORONTO (CP)—More women are assuming greater responsibility in Canadian business and industrial life than ever before, says Mrs. W. F. Baylay of Meadowdale, Ont., national president of the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

In releasing the federation's authoritative list of women in public life in Canada, Mrs. Baylay said that the trend indicates that more women are receiving recognition in a wide variety of endeavors.

Mrs. Baylay said "the appointment of B and P member Miss Ruth Addison, Ottawa, to the civil service commission in January of this year was a step in the right direction. The federation had petitioned the government for a woman to be placed in this position on numerous occasions."

Other B and P women, Mrs. R.

Reginald Arkell, Vancouver; Mrs. Angus L. Macdonald, Halifax; Mrs. Alfred Paradis, Jr., Montreal; and Miss Vida Peene, Toronto, received appointments to the newly formed Canada Council.

Receiving recognition in the nation sphere was Senator Nancy Hodges, of Victoria and Ottawa, who acted as Speaker of the Senate and Mrs. Ruth Houck of Brampton, Ont., appointed governor of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

In the East, Mrs. Alma Gosselin Carboneau of Montreal is the first woman negotiator for the City of Montreal in its contract dispute with its 3,000 white-collar workers.

Miss Iphigene Arseneault of Charlottetown is the only Canadian woman to be appointed as commissioner for the Red Cross Society.
