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Dodgers Down Chicago Cubs 10-2; Bankhead Another Sore-Arm Case

Brooklyn Dodgers Thursday overwhelmed Chicago Cubs 10-2 in a National League game, but uncovered another sore-arm case.

Dan Bankhead, making his first major-league start in place of the ailing Don Newcombe, had to quit with two out in the Chicago half of the sixth inning. He allowed one run and four hits, and walked as many batters in receiving credit for the victory.

Bankhead complained about his right shoulder a few minutes after the Brooklyn club announced that Newcombe had been sent home for a complete rest and that Malcolm Mallette has been put on the disabled list, pending an operation on his right shoulder.

Sparked by Bruce Edwards' double with the bases loaded, the Dodgers drove the losing Cub starter Walter Dubiel from the mound in the third as they scored five runs to make the score 7-0. The Brooks scored two more runs off their old team-mate, Paul Minner, and another off Frank Hiller, former New York Yankee.

Pee-wee Reese, Dodger captain, celebrated his 1,000th major-league game by being thrown out by an umpire for the first time in his career. He tossed his bat in the air after questioning umpire Babe Pinelli's decision on a third strike in the fifth inning.

Four home runs gave Boston Braves an easy 12-6 victory over Cincinnati Reds.

Earl Torgeson, Sam Jethroe, Willard Marshall and Connie Ryan hit for the circuit, and six Cincinnati errors helped the visiting club.

A home run by third baseman Nanny Fernandez in the ninth inning with two out and Ralph Kiner on base broke a tie and gave Pittsburgh Pirates a 3-1 win over New York Giants.

The clout was delivered at the expense of Larry Jansen, Giants' star righthander. The only other Pittsburgh run, tying the score in the seventh, also came via a homer. Johnny Hopp hit it into the visitors' bullpen.

Dick Sisler, batting in five runs with five hits including a homer in five times at bat led Philadelphia Phillies in a 9-6 assault against St. Louis Cardinals.

With the annual meetings of the City Junior and Island Intermediate Baseball Leagues being held tonight at the Armouries here and the Town Hall at Summerside respectively, some definite information as to what we can expect to see in the way of baseball this season should be forthcoming as the result of these meetings.

The two leagues, which will probably constitute the bulk of baseball competition this year, will be electing their new officers and laying their plans for the season as well as determining the teams who will compose those leagues, and iron out the many details that they will be confronted with before the schedules get underway.

This, of course, is assuming that the leagues mentioned will operate again this year, which they have in the past. That will be one of the first issues that both organizations will have to take up tonight before anything else is done. However, these plans are only in the embryo stage at the moment, and either one set-up or the other will depend largely on what the teams from the Western Capital are planning on doing.

Whatever these leagues do decide at their meetings tonight, we hope it will be for the best in furthering the interests and future of baseball here for all concerned. One of the best ways of assuring this, which will be brought to light at tonight's meeting at Summerside, is to have everyone who is interested in its welfare, whether he be player, official, coach or fan. By doing this, you give the officials who are trying to find out what is needed, the benefit of individual and general opinion and support. From this they can develop such leagues, etc., that will be to the mutual benefit of all.

Speaking of baseball, those were certainly fine baseball films shown at the Armouries Wednesday night through the courtesy of the Bike Shop and the Department of Physical Fitness. The instructional ones in particular were of great value to those who want to brush up on their game. With the best in the National and American Leagues exhibiting how it is done, there were no doubt many of the 300 or more in attendance who benefited by it toward the betterment of their own playing ability. There were many valuable pointers given on many phases of the game, and although it is not likely that anyone benefitted in a practical way at the moment, they certainly learned a lot of theory that they can use to good advantage if they want to apply it through their own individual effort and practice.

Those individuals and organizations who make the showing of such films possible through their goodwill and public spirit, are deserving of much thanks and appreciation, and it is hoped that better sport and sportsmanship will prevail, to justify their efforts.

Lefty Ed Lopat, the loser, and righthander Don Johnson received the full charge of the White Sox onslaught, a total of 23 hits. In the meantime, Bob Cain, rookie southpaw, stifled the Yankees with five hits, three of them by little Phil Rizzuto.

Big Gus Zernial and rookie outfielder Jim Busby led the Yankees attack, collecting four hits apiece. Righthander Bob Lemon snapped Boston Red Sox six-game Fenway Park winning streak as Cleveland Indians took a three-game series finale by a 5-4 margin.

Catcher Jim Hegan opened the ninth with his second two-bagger of the game and, after being sacrificed by Lemon, registered the winning run after Dale Mitchell fled out to Ted Williams.

The Sox gave their Mel Parnell a three-run send off by bashing Lemon for three singles and a double in the first inning. They added their final marker by bunching three more singles in the sixth.

Vic Wertz and Hoot Evers combined their hitting power with Art Houtteman's effective pitching as Detroit Tigers handed Philadelphia Athletics an 8-5 defeat.

Wertz and Evers drove in seven runs between them. Houtteman doled out only five hits in gaining his third pitching triumph.

20,000 To Attend First Sunday Ball Game In Toronto

 TORONTO, May 4—(CP)—Toronto will be caught with its celebrated scruples down on Sunday, much to the delight of the 88,108 citizens who exercised their franchise last New Year's Day and voted for organized Sunday sport in the city. It should be fun.

The official barriers-down ceremony will be held at the lakefront Maple Leaf Stadium, where two on-airport "Play Ball" will inaugurate this departure from tradition as Toronto's Maple Leaf and Jersey City Giants of the International Baseball League meet in a regular league doubleheader.

More than 20,000 fans will be on hand to root for the home team and also to become charter members of the "I-saw-the-first-organized-Sunday-ball-game" club in the city. The event has the full blessing of city fathers and Ontario authorities but the head men of both won't be around.

Premier Frost "will be away for the week-end and won't be at the game," his office told the Canadian Press today. It was the same at Mayor Hiram (Buck) McCallum's office — "the Mayor has an out-of-town appointment," an official said.

The explosive Sunday-sports issue was given its head last fall when City Council voted to place it before the people as a side issue in the civic elections.

The campaign far outshouted the mayoralty and other civic-office races and when the votes were counted 88,103 voted for it and 81,793 registered "no" votes.

The follow-through was automatic. City Council passed the necessary by-law and the Ontario Legislature pinned its seal of approval on it early in April.

The International League was prepared. Two schedules had been drawn-up — one with 11 Toronto Sunday dates and the other with none — and distributed to news services. The "Sunday Ball" schedule was released immediately legislation was passed and the boom for tickets out loose.

Applications came in from nearly every Ontario city, setting an unprecedented demand for first-Sunday-game tickets but for all 11 dates.

Stadium officials are putting 6,000 tickets aside this Sunday. "We'll take care of any out-of-town fans who want something to do on Sunday," general manager Joe Zeigler said today.

Toronto is a Johnny-come-lately in this Sunday-sports business. Montreal Royals, also of the International League, have had Sunday dates for years and all sports, including horse-racing, are given their head in Quebec — all paid admissions.

Canadiens who went into tonight's contest with a 3-0 lead in the series put up a stubborn battle but were no match for the Pats who staged a terrific last-ditch stand.

PHILADELPHIA, May 4—(AP)—Welterweight champion Ray (Sugar) Robinson and Robert Villemain, French middleweight king, will clash June 5 here in a 15-round fight, promoter Phil Glassman announced today.

Rolfe Outlines Pennant Hopes Of Detroit Tigers

PHILADELPHIA, May 4—(AP)—First baseman Dick Kryhoski and pitcher Hal Newhouse hold the key to Detroit's American League pennant hopes, says Tiger manager Red Rolfe.

Rolfe, former New York Yankee great, was talking about his team after tonight's game with Philadelphia Athletics was rained out. The Tigers currently lead the league with six victories in nine games.

"If the kid (Kryhoski is 25) comes through well he's tough. He hasn't been hitting yet but I believe Dick is a developing ball player. He's strong, willing and when he gets hold of the ball it goes for a long ride."

"I'm keeping my fingers crossed because if Kryhoski doesn't come through, I don't think we can win the pennant."

Rolfe expects Newhouse to start taking his regular turn on the mound within a week or 10 days. The great southpaw pitched hitting practice Sunday and showed no signs of the shoulder ailment that has kept him idle all spring.

"Newhouse will have to come back strong. You can't lose hurlers the calibre of Hal and still win pennants. It just isn't being done."

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
