B., has been wrecked on the coast of Ireland. The crew were saved. Capt. Hickey, of the firm of Hickey & Stewart, has returned from Kentucky, where he has been selecting the firm's stock of tobacco leaf. The object is a worthy one, and it is hoped the young ladies who have the matter in hand will meet with a bumper house. The statement telegraphed over the country that there are forty cases of smallpox in the lower town, Ottawa, and that the French-Canadians there oppose vaccination is absolutely without foundation. There are only six cases in the smallpox hospital there and only one in the city outside the hospital. It is currently reported that the late Sgt. Archd. McKinnon died of smallpox. His brother requests us to contradict the report and publish the following certificate: CHARLOTTETOWN, Nov. 11, 1885. This certifies that Mr. Archd. McKinnon died of typhoid fever and of no other disease. DR. McLEOD. Presentation.—Last evening, previous to Mr. James Reid's departure for his home in Dorchester, N. B., Mr. T. C. Connor, contractor for the Dominion Building, invited him to his residence, Hillsborough Square, and presented him with an elegant gold watch and chain. Mr. Reid was entirely taken by surprise, and in a few suitable words thanked the donor. The watch and chain were imported for the purpose by Mr. Taylor. Owing to an order issued by the Board of Health preventing the assembling of any large concourse of citizens in any Hall, the Rock Band Concert Company are debarred from giving any further entertainments in the city at present. The first named gentleman took thirty-three from this city, and will take eight from Summerside. Mr. Trask took forty-eight which were selected by Mr. W. S. McKie of this city. In addition Mr. McKie sent thirteen fine horses to Mr. Benson, of New Bedford. It was, no doubt, owing to the smallpox scare, that so small an audience were present last night to greet the Rock Band Concert Company. WAR IN THE EAST.

BURMAH TO BE INVADED.

Every Preparation for a Struggle.

CALCUTTA, Nov. 13. Lord Dufferin, Viceroy of India, has ordered Gen. Pendergrast, Commander of the Burmese expeditionary force, to invade Burmah forthwith and proceed with all haste to Caplu, Mandalay. The British forces will now cross the frontier immediately. Recent despatches from Rangoon state that the inhabitants of districts in British Burmah, where no large garrisons are maintained, are greatly alarmed over reports that King Thebaw has subsidized 15,000 Dacoits to cross the frontier and begin plundering and murdering at the first note of war. The Dacoits are robbers, who work in large gangs, and are noted for their bold exploits, having neither baggage nor a commissariat. These bands travel with marvellous speed, and it will be hard for the British troops to catch them. RANGOON, Nov. 13. The British troops will mass at Thayemyo, and will thence make an attack on the Minpa, where the Burmese troops are arriving. Reinforcements have been sent to Loang-bee, which is menaced by a force of 6,000 Burmese. LONDON, Nov. 13. Servia has declared war against Bulgaria. NEW YORK, Nov. 13. The Commercial Advertiser's cable special from London says: A report has been received from the first division of the flotilla transporting Gen. Pendergrast's column for the invasion of the native Burmah. The boats were west, on their way to Thayemyo, 240 miles from Rangoon, when heard from. Additional reinforcements sent on the frontier have reached the post occupied by Gorkhas, and the force defending the line is reported to have adequate means for any emergency likely to arise until the invading division is in complete possession of the rivers in King Thebaw's territory. The Indian Government prevented the intelligence of decision of the Cabinet to wage war. The actual departure of the advance of Gen. Pendergrast's expedition, and the commencement of the work of embanking the remainder until too late for Burmese to receive accurate information.

METEOROLOGICAL OFFICE.

Late measurements give the height of the great Mexican volcano, Popocatepeti, as 17,869 feet above the sea. The crater, which is completely obscured within by sulphurous vapor, is about 2 1/2 miles in circuit and 1,600 feet deep. The entire centre of the top of the mountain seems to be solid sulphur, which is deposited at the rate of about a ton a day.
