ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The Longshoremen's Protective Union (Ind.) unloaded one ship Friday but the dispute to ease the strain of the 35 days the port has been inactive. A smaller coastal freighter, the Whitecoat, carrying household goods and appliances from Halifax for a department store was handled. The longshoremen made clear this was in no way a break in the tie-up. President Norman Donovan said the union made arrangements with the store for the unloading of the vessel. The harbor has been nearly empty for a month. Rows of sheds and warehouses appear abandoned except for maintenance men or watchmen. Meanwhile, Friday the union continued to move its pocket lines further from the city along the CNR mainline toward Port Aux Basques. TRUCKERS MOVE OUT Truckers had been moving further out to remote sidings to pick up freight when the union picketed the CNR yards. With the union moving out as well, the consignees and truckers may not find it feasible to drive hundreds of miles just to bring in a few tons of goods. More than 800 carloads of goods are stranded on tracks between Port Aux Basques and St. John's. Another 500 wait clearance at North Sydney, N.S. Newfoundland-bound freight is also being stored in a National Harbors Board warehouse at Halifax. The dispute came to a head April 24 when the union turned down demands of the St. John's Employers Association which represents six shipping companies. The companies were asking for increased authority over longshoremen. The union voted almost unanimously for strike action. Prime Minister Pearson has said he would take it up with Federal Labor Minister MacEachern, and Premier Smallwood has said his government's hands were tied due to the federal nature of the dispute. The strike has thrown nearly 1,000 men out of work and many more have been affected to some extent. The Newfoundland Board of Trade called a meeting for late Friday but no announcement was expected following the meeting.

ALBERTON — Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown, visited the Sacred Heart Parish at Alberton earlier this week. Monday evening he confirmed 48 children and two adults. Bishop MacEachern was assisted by Rev. Faber Macdonald, chancellor, and by Rev. Reginald Phelan of Foster River and Rev. Gerald Steele, parish priest at Alberton. The bishop spoke to the children and their parents emphasizing the responsibilities of parents in giving proper training to their children and of setting them a good example of Christian living. R. D. MacKinnon led the congregational singing. Mrs. E.B. Laverie was organist. Tuesday morning Bishop MacEachern, accompanied by Father Macdonald and Father Steele, visited Alberton Industries Ltd. and the Riforman at Alberton South, also the Western Hospital at Alberton. At noon His Excellency was guest of honor at the parochial house when Father Steele was host to representatives of other Alberton churches. The guests were Rev. M. R. **GAS SALES DECLINE**  
OTTAWA (CP) — Sales of natural gas in Canada in February declined to 3,925,377,000 cubic feet from 52,074,391,000 in the same month last year, the bureau of statistics said Friday. Revenue from these sales rose to \$3,533,097 in April from \$36,602,001 a year previous.
