THE REV. C. LEFEBVRE.

The Very Reverend Camille Lefebvre, C. S. C., D. D., Apostolic Missionary, whose laudable death THE EXAMINER announced yesterday, was the founder of St. Joseph's College and its Superior until his death. He was born at St. Philippe, Laprairie, County, P. Q., on the 14th of February of the year of our Lord 1817.

In 1871 Rev. Father Lefebvre was made provincial superior of his order in Canada, which position he filled until the spring of 1880. In 1874, he went to France to recruit subjects for his order, and in 1876 he was made Apostolic Missionary by the Holy See. Being an ardent preacher, the several missions that he conducted in different parts of the country have always borne abundant fruit.

THE BRITANNIA RECORD.

When the fleet of improvised Brazilian cruisers, dramatic and otherwise, was being fitted up at New York a year ago the magnificent yachtlike steamship Britannia, now the America, attracted almost as much attention as the Nictheroy, which had the dynamite gun aboard. She possessed an interesting history which was fruitful of disappointment and failure, and when it was announced in marine circles that the Britannia had been sold for \$15,000 the mariners who were acquainted with the craft said she was well sold. She was described as a "brute" in heavy weather and it reports from Brazil since she has not improved. She ruined the man who conceived her construction. She was discarded by the Sultan of Turkey, who was desired for several times as his private yacht and, finally, after many adventures, drifted into the hands of a Boston firm, her conversion into a cruiser of doubtful strength and usefulness is a matter of recent history. Now as the Brazilian cruiser America is about to be launched, The Champion Derrick and Wrecking Company is suing the owners of the vessel for \$9,000 commission for having sold her to the representative of the Brazilian government.

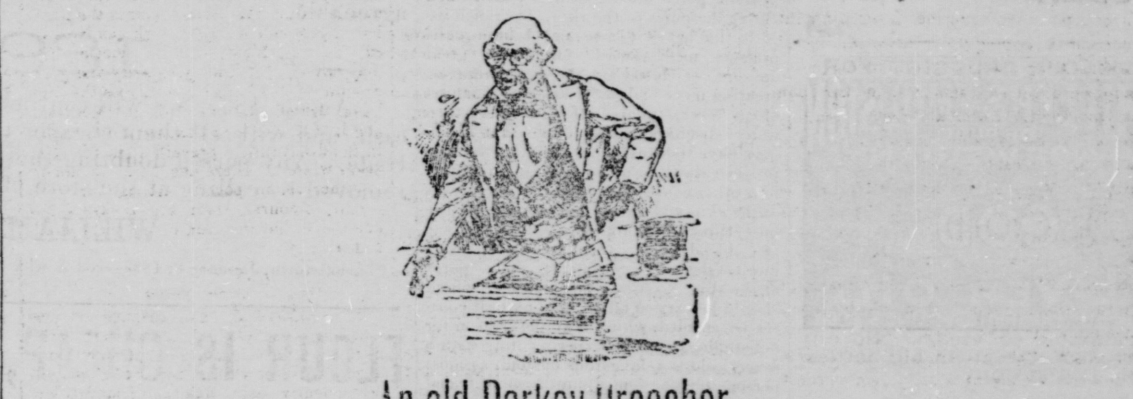
