English Official Here To Consider Rugby Situation

Dr. Bill Fallowfield, secretary of the English Rugby League and secretary of the Rugby League International Board, arrived in Charlottetown last evening for the purpose of investigating the possibilities of organized English Rugby-Football here in the Maritimes.

Dr. Fallowfield came to the Island en route back to England from the United States where he discussed rugby with many interested groups in the State of California.

The doctor will stay on the Island until early next week when he returns to Great Britain, leaving Canada from Montreal. During his stay in the province, Mr. Fallowfield will meet many of the local rugby-football officials and will consider with them the possibilities of organized rugby around the Maritimes and states that it is the desire of the English League to have a Canadian team go on an exhibition tour of Great Britain in 1955.

An open meeting of everyone interested in rugby will be held at Prince of Wales College at 8 p.m. on Thursday evening, at which time two films will be shown of the Rugby League Cup finals at Wembley Stadium, London, which incidentally were attended by an average of 95,000 fans a game.

Dr. Fallowfield, who is a resident of Leeds, Yorkshire, states that the people in England are even more enthusiastic over their rugby than the Canadians are for hockey. The country has 31 professional clubs, approximately 850 amateur teams and another 850 school teams in

organized leagues and competitive play. Attendances at the larger stadiums occasionally top the 100,000 mark which can be compared with the crowd of 27,300 which attended the Grey Cup final in Toronto's Varsity Stadium last Saturday.

Before coming to this continent, the doctor attended the International Cup finals in France between the four major entries — Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and France. The cup was won by the English representatives.

When the Australian and New Zealand teams were returning home via America, Mr. Fallowfield journeyed with them to Long Beach and Los Angeles, California, where they staged several exhibition games to arouse interest in the famous English sport.

MELBOURNE (AP) — Australian hunters hooted Lew Hoad and cheered Red Hartwig Tuesday and the Americans refused to despair of their Davis Cup chance despite quarter-final reverses in the Victoria tennis championships.

Vic Seixas, nimble U.S. champion, was the sole American survivor in a weird day. Other winners included Hoad, once on the brink of defeat; Hartwig, new darling of Australian net fans and Ken Rosewall, who may sit out the Davis Cup challenge round at Sydney Dec. 27-29.

Seixas, in rare touch, scored a five-set victory over Australian titleholder Mervyn Rose, 6-3, 6-4, 3-6, 4-6, 6-4.

On Thursday he plays lachrymical Hoad who drew jeers from spectators as he barely squeezed out a verdict over Sven Davidson, Sweden, 6-3, 2-6, 1-6, 6-0, 10-8.

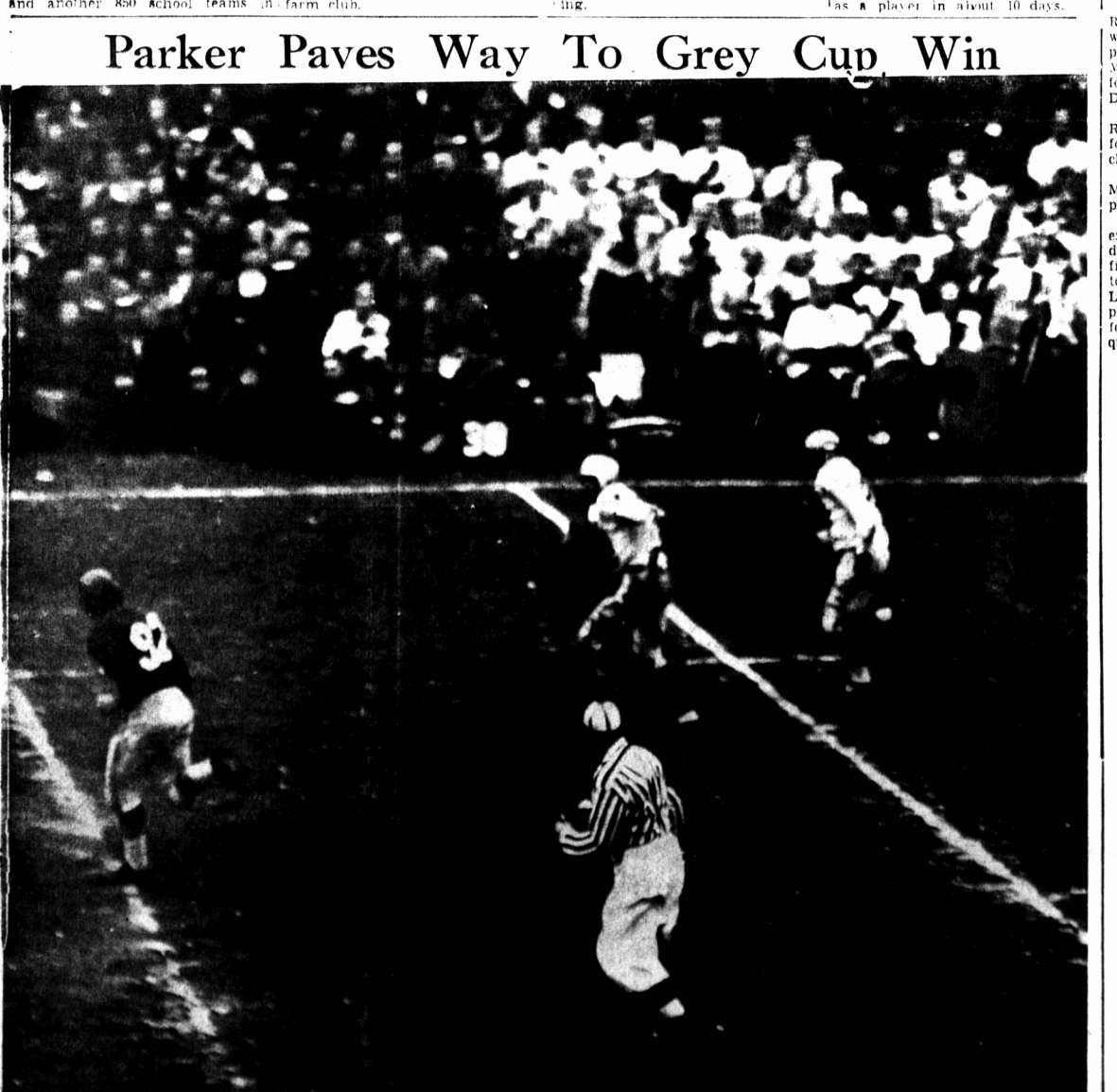

90 U. S. Stations Carried Grey Cup Game On TV

NEW YORK (CP) — Officials of the National Broadcasting Company, which televised last Saturday's Grey Cup thriller from Toronto, estimated Tuesday about 90 stations in the United States carried the telecast.

However, they did not include the Canadian football classic, won by Edmonton 26-25 over Montreal, as many watchers as it might have on any other weekend.

The reason was that the game conflicted with the annual Army-Navy game, the major attraction of the U.S. college football season, carried on the American Broadcasting Company network.

Tom Galley, NBC sports director, said the Grey Cup game "was as fine a football game as I've ever looked at." However, he added that NBC didn't even bother to have the game's spectator ratings tallied because it was felt the Grey Cup just couldn't compete with the Army-Navy game.
