WE were pleased to learn that the young men who were injured in the store of Messrs. Norton & Fennell, a day or two ago, are recovering from their injuries.

WE were in error yesterday in stating that the new temperance organization was that of a division of the Order of Good Templars; it is a division of the Sons of Temperance.

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon two drunks were fined \$2 each, a dog tax delinquent was attended to, and the trial of a young man charged with obtaining goods under false pretences was adjourned until to-morrow.

THE City Cornet Band Excursion in the steamer St. Lawrence last evening was a very successful affair. The moon shone brightly, the temperature was about right, and the large number present appeared to enjoy themselves immensely.

ABOUT ninety of the city truckmen assembled on Queen Square this forenoon where their teams were examined by the Truck Committee of the City Council, assisted by the City Marshal. Four of the horses were condemned as unfit for use and the remainder pronounced fairly good.

THE Halifax Chronicle says that the noble red man is apparently not on the decline in Nova Scotia. The descendants of the Micmacs in that province numbered 1,666 in 1871. By 1881 they had increased to 2,125, an increase of 2.75 per cent., a greater proportionate increase than among the English, Scotch, Irish or French population of the province.

GOPEL TEMPERANCE.—Capt. Sturdivant held a very interesting service last evening at the Gospel Army Hall, and a goodly number of persons took the Total Abstinence Pledge. Capt. S. will speak at County Line this evening, and to-morrow evening at Montague Bridge, and Sunday he speaks at Summerside. On next Monday evening he speaks here by invitation of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, further notice of which will be given. Capt. S. leaves the Island next Wednesday for St. John and the United States.

MR. T. C. ROBINS, the popular young Captain of the Salvage Corps, was last evening the recipient of a valuable wedding present from the members of the Corps. The gift was a silver ice pichener, standing about 19 inches in height, handsomely chased, with goblet to match. The presentation was made by Lieut. Longworth, who tendered the best wishes of the donors to the Captain and his fair partner. Capt. Robins, who was taken completely by surprise, returned the thanks of himself and Mrs. Robins for the beautiful present, and expressed the hope that the members of the Corps would live long and prosperously.

YOUNG O'Neill, who was accidentally shot at Vernon O'Neill last week, has been able to write on a slate that the gun he carried was not cocked nor half cocked, but was loaded and capped. He put it over the fence before him, and mounted to go over himself, and in reaching the ground one of his feet touched the hammer, which, not being pressed back far enough to stay, immediately sprung back, with the dangerous result he is now suffering from. He lay senseless for some time, and after coming to, he tried to make his way to the nearest house, for which he had to recross the fence and go through the fields. After falling exhausted three times he finally reached Mr. O'Donnell's house, where every possible care was taken of him. Last night he spent comparatively easy, and some hopes are now entertained of his life being spared.

THE Summerside Journal says that the schr Lodi, Capt. Green, went ashore on Tryon shoals, during the storm on Wednesday evening of last week, which heavily laden with coal. The captain entered a protest at Craupaud the following morning, and with the assistance of several landmen (the crew having deserted the ship) he was compelled to jettison about forty tons of the cargo of seventy-five tons, before the vessel would float. It was not until Friday morning that any of the men put in an appearance, and the ship sighted for the next tide. But to the captain's amazement, when the time arrived for sailing, his crew were missing and his ship's boat. Bound not to be outdone, and his ship's boat, he went to the aid of the schooner, and with his characteristic energy and courage, he got his craft out of the water, and brought her safely into port here without the assistance of his chicken-hearted crew, who pulled the heavy boat all the way from Craupaud, who by the way, did not arrive here for nearly twelve hours after the gallant Capt. had moored his ship in safety at Queen's wharf. Such indomitable energy and pluck on the part of one person, situated as Capt. Green was, is seldom seen.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Collapse of Suspension Bridges.

VIENNA, Sept. 15.

A suspension bridge in the town of Ofiran in Moravia, collapsed to-day while a squadron of Uhlan's were riding across. The Uhlan's and a number of spectators were all precipitated into the river. Seven persons were killed and many seriously injured.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.

Albert Bridge at Belfast collapsed to-day, twenty persons were thrown into the river and four drowned.

The Cholera.

LONDON, Sept. 15.

The cholera is gaining ground in Austria. It is worse at Lie, a village near Agram of 900 inhabitants. Ninety have been stricken, and 28 of them have died almost immediately. The people distrust the doctors and conceal the sick as long as possible. In one house a mother and her daughter were found half naked on the bare floor writhing in the agony of death, and in another room lay the body of the father, upon which had been thrown the corpse of a son. The villagers are too frightened to help one another.

Parliamentary Matters.

LONDON, Sept. 15.

It is now understood that after further talk the appropriations for the Irish Constabulary, the Parnellites will cease their exhausting labors in the debate, and that the remaining appropriations will be rapidly passed. It is expected that the discussion of the supply bill will be finished on Saturday night, and Parnell's bill will be discussed on Monday. Parliament will probably be prorogued a week from Saturday.

The Dominion Alliance.

TORONTO, Sept. 15.

The Dominion Alliance held a two days' debate on the question of a formation of a third party. Ultimately a resolution was carried reaffirming the stand previously taken by the Alliance, and recommending that an independent candidate be run in cases where neither political nominee will pledge himself to support prohibition in Parliament.

HALIFAX, Sept. 15.

The trial of the David J. Adams, seized at Digby, begins to-morrow before Commissioner McLellan, and Chief Justice McDonald will sit on the 28th to hear the argument.

The British steamers Strathairn and Clan Graham collided in the Clyde to-day, the former was sunk.
