U.S. space physicians already have perhaps detected this same problem.

American doctors are not sure that this was caused by weightlessness. They plan to increase space flight times gradually to follow any physiological effects.

The Russians are the leading experts on what happens to man in space, because their cosmonauts have flown longer.

Valerie Bykovsky circled the earth for 19 hours - almost five full days.

Now, through a Moscow broadcast from the news agency Tass, Dr. Roman Bayevsky and Dr. Oleg Garenko tell details of

changes in the heart actions of Soviet spacemen. The cosmonauts were fitted with radio-monitoring devices.

The pulse rate slowed and amid electrical conduction of the heart, which regulates heart beat. The heart had lower general working capacity.

"Bayevsky and Garenko note that the lower level of the functioning of the heart and readjustment" of the card overwork system to a new level should cause a certain weakening of the heart muscle," the reports said.

"However, for future prolonged flights, it is extremely

important to establish the degree of "weakness" of the heart" for safety both during flight and on return to earth.

It truly there is any "weakening" hazard, it might be counteracted by creating artificial gravity, as by spinning the spacecraft. Or special exercises might be helpful.

It also is just possible that man's earth-adjusted heart, not his imaginative mind and technology - might deny us dream of exploring the moon and planets.

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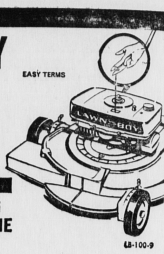
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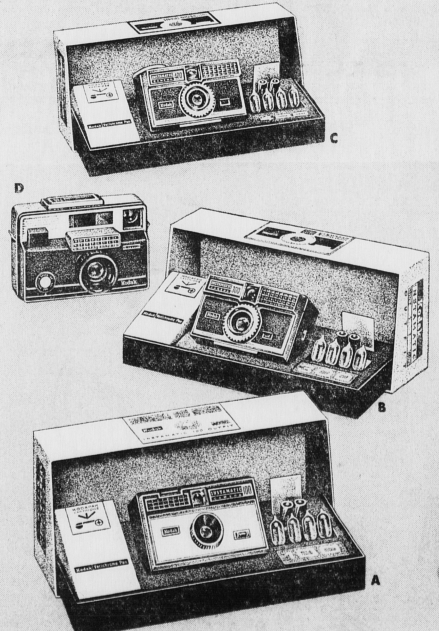
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
