Three Provinces Agree To Plan For Relief

OTTAWA, (CP)—British Columbia, Manitoba and Newfoundland have accepted a federal government plan for unemployment relief. The speech from the throne read at the closing of Parliament, noted that federal and provincial representatives met here in June to work out a cost-sharing scheme for relief of needy unemployed.

Parliament Closes, Speech Indicates Healthy Economy

OTTAWA (CP)—The endurance-tested second session of Canada's 22nd Parliament came to an end Thursday after establishing a modern record of 140 days duration, a mark which hasn't been exceeded in 47 years. Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin prorogued the session with the reading of the speech from the throne, enumerating many of the legislative measures on which Parliament has worked since Jan. 7.

Turn Down Beaverbrook As Trade Czar To Boost U.K. Exports To Canada

"Figures for the early part of 1955 show that our exports to Canada, far from recovering, have fallen still further," Low told the House of Commons. He also defended Britain's investment record in Canada, and said that more is essential.
