GET YOURS EARLY.—Tickets for Commander Cheyne's lecture on Monday evening are on sale at the usual places.

HEARTZ'S HALL.—Rev. Mr. Howard will preach at Hertz's Hall tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

Y. M. C. A.—A meeting of the city young men will be held on Monday morning next at 10.30, in the Y. M. C. A. parlour. The business is to make final arrangements for the Week of Prayer.

MIDNIGHT MASS.—A rehearsal of the musical portion of the programme for Midnight Mass took place in St. Dunstan's pro-Cathedral last evening. The rehearsal was a most successful one.

THE WEATHER.—Fair with strong winds or moderate gales from the westward, turning much colder; moderate to fresh winds with fine decidedly cold weather on Sunday.

FOR ST. JOHN.—Mr. C. Kane, Summerside, shipped 150 sheep and lambs from here last Wednesday morning for the St. John market. This is one of the latest shipments of sheep ever made from here.—Agriculturist.

LOTS OF SMELTS.—It is said that smelts have been so plentiful at Porter's Lake N. S., lately that the residents have been dipping them up with their hands and loading carts with them. There was not more than six inches of water, and millions of smelts.

THEFT FROM A SCHOOL.—The Western school building at Summerside was broken into on Thursday night and some exercise books belonging to the pupils and a quantity of stove pipe was taken therefrom. The thieves broke a padlock on the cellar and from the cellar got up into the school-room.

LOST HIS SPEECH.—The St. Andrew's N. B. Beacon says: A strange case is reported from St. George. Several days ago John Brown, stone cutter, who lives near Letany, went to his barn to feed his horse. He could speak well enough when he went out to the horse, but when he returned his power of speech was entirely gone. At latest accounts his speech had not been restored. It is supposed that his condition is due to paralysis. It is only about a year ago since he lost one of his eyes by a flying piece of stone. His case is one that has evoked a great deal of sympathy.

METHODISM IN EASTERN CANADA.—The December number of the London Wesleyan Methodist Magazine contains a historical and descriptive paper on Methodism in Eastern Canada, by Dr. Wilson a native of this province. The paper is illustrated by portraits of Rev. William Black, Rev. Dr. Daniel, Rev. Dr. Rice, General Superintendent Cameron and Charles F. Allison. There is also a view of St. John, a cut of Centenary church and one of the Methodist church at Marysville. The Wesleyan Magazine, which was begun in John Wesley's time, is now in its 120th year.

FINE GUELPH CATTLE.—Thos. Dean, of the country market determined some time since that his display of beef at the Christmas season would be fully up to if not superior to that of any other butcher doing business in St. John. He has purchased ten head of cattle raised at Guelph, Ontario, which are described as the very pick of the fine beef raising district. The animals have arrived here, and will be slaughtered tomorrow. Their exhibition in Mr. Dean's spacious stall next week should prove a drawing card. Concerning the animals above mentioned the Guelph Mercury says in describing the heifer which carried off the Jubilee Sweepstake prize of \$60 at the Guelph Fat Stock Show: "This animal is considered by many good judges to be the finest in America. She has won seventeen first prizes previous to this exhibition." Another of the lot is the first prize steer in its class at the same show, which the Mercury says, "made such a close competition with the heifer." The price paid for these animals was about \$150 apiece.—St. John Sun.

ENGLISH SOCIAL CUSTOMS.

At the Christmas dinner of the new Vagabonds Club, on Friday, Rear Admiral Lord Charles Bressford was the guest of the evening. He created quite a stir by his plain speaking on social questions. "Money," he declared, "is now everything among us. Any vulgarian of whatever nationality, whether he has gained money honorably or disgracefully, could buy his way among those who are described as 'the best and proudest in the land,' if they worship the golden calf.
