Local Cattle Trio Off To Royal Fair

A trio of Prince Edward Island cattle two Jerseys and one Holstein were shipped out of the Maritimes during the weekend and two of them will be sold at national sales at the time of the Royal Winter Fair.

Oswald Newson and son Clyde River are sending Diamond Hill Rocket a Holstein calf. George MacMillan, Cornwall and Albert Boswall, Marshfield, are sending Jersey Standard Lea a yearling Jersey bull and James Vickerson, North River, is sending a three-year old heifer, Warren Grove Paul's Theresa.

There is some unusually good breeding behind the Warren Grove heifer. Her dam was classified "excellent" with a "ton-of-gold" one of the high production honors of the Jersey breed. Her paternal grand-dam is a "Supreme Excellent" cow with a silver medal has a double ton-of-gold rating. 4,000 pounds butterfat — and a grand champion in the show ring.

Her maternal granddam is also a "Supreme Excellent" cow with 4,000 pound butterfat — twice a ton-of-gold — and winner of first prize in province of dam at the Provincial Exhibition in Charlottetown for the last seven years.

TOP BREEDER

Theresa's granddam, River-north Beacon's Maid was bred by the late Edison B. Mutch, North River one of the top men of the breed at one time. Her total production to date totals 4,822 pounds butterfat and 90096 pounds milk.

last election that will be fought on the basis of present riding boundaries. They were set in 1952 on the basis of the 1951 census.

A new electoral map, using 1961 census figures, has been drawn up under a new system. Ten non-political commissions, one for each province, started working on new boundaries last January and their decisions will become law around the middle of next year.

The reshuffling job used to be done by a Parliamentary committee dominated by the government of the day and prone to political considerations.

Advance-poll ballot boxes remain sealed until 9 p.m. local standard time on election night.

Results of the service vote are to be announced next Saturday, Nov. 13, at Ottawa.

Service votes are added to the civilian vote in each riding to get the final total for each candidate. In 1963 the service vote elected one Liberal who had trailed a Conservative by 92 votes in the election — night count.

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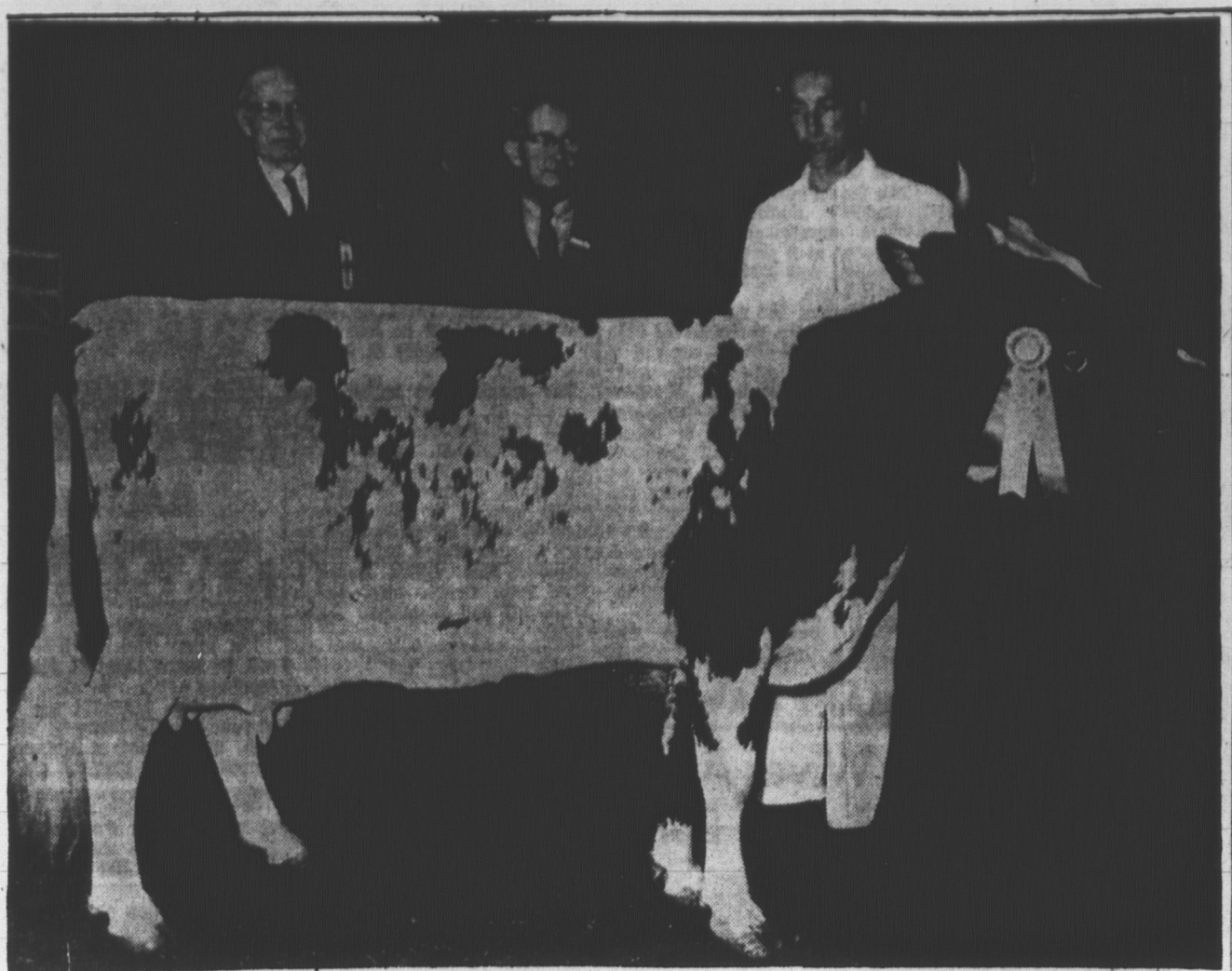
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ISLAND BREEDER PRODUCES WINNER

Saturday Night Rally Closes Queens Campaign For PC's

More than 1,500 people jammed the Confederation Centre theatre Saturday night for the final rally in the dual riding of Queens to be held by Conservative candidates J. Angus MacLean and Heath MacQuarrie.

The candidates, joined by Premier Walter R. Shaw and provincial attorney general M.A. Farmer, told the gathering of the necessity of voting in this election. "This is a most important election and every citizen should be prepared to go to the polls and make his wishes known", Angus MacLean stated.

Heath MacQuarrie added to his teammate's statements saying "I am sure the people of this county and the whole province have weighed the issues, compared records and are ready to go to the polls to express their wishes. I have never been convinced that there was an apathetic feeling towards this election in this province but rather that the people have from the early stages of the campaign been quietly but surely judging the people, the issues and the records."

Both candidates termed the campaign as one of the best they had been privileged to take part in. They noted that they had had tremendously gratifying meetings from the beginning of the campaign and that the meetings had increased in size and enthusiasm as the campaign progressed. "We have been pleased and impressed by the enthusiasm and interest of the people of this riding, the candidates said.

Premier Shaw and Mr. Farmer expressed much the same views, adding that they hoped each and every voter would "take seriously his duty as a citizen on election day."

An invitation was extended to the public to join with the candidates on election evening at the Community Centre in Charlottetown where results will be coming in shortly after the close of the polls.

Professional entertainers added a light note to the meeting. Television stars Catherine and Patricia MacKinnon, Brian Abern and Athen Katsos of Don Messer's Jubilee, Sing Along Jubilee, and Frank's Bandstand fame were joined by Charlottetown folksingers Ken Campbell and Ed Doiron to provide the crowd with an hour-long show.

To Add Four Draggeres To Souris Fishing Fleet

Four new draggers will be added to the deep-sea fishing fleet at Souris, it was announced during the weekend by Hon. Leo Rossiter, minister of fisheries, following a meeting late

last week of the Fisherman's Loan Board.

It is expected that two of the new vessels will go into operation out of the port of Souris in June, 1966, and the other two are slated for service two months later, in August.

Mr. Rossiter said last night applications for the four new vessels have been approved by the loan board. They will of steel and wood construction, and while specifications for the ships have not yet been made public, he said the new trawlers will be substantially larger than any now working out of Souris.

At present, the dragger fleet at Souris numbers 19 vessels, and it is expected the addition of four larger ships will mean a big jump in production at the Kings County port.

Commenting on the announcement, Mr. Rossiter stated: "It is expected that these four new, large ships will guarantee the fish packing plans at Souris continuing at full capacity, and it is reasonable to expect further expansion of these plants will be necessary in the near future, as the dragger fleet continues to expand."
