

IRELAND.

The news from Ireland is unimportant. The presence of an immense military force prevents any attempt at insubordination. Mr. Martin, of the *Felon* newspaper, who was convicted of publishing felonious articles in his paper—was sentenced on the 19th August to transportation for ten years.—Mr. O'Dougherty, editor of the *Tribune* newspaper, was tried a second time for the same offence as that for which Mr. Martin is punished; but the Jury, as on his former trial, could not agree, and they were discharged. A vast number of persons were arrested on suspicion, but little or no importance appears to be attached to those arrests.

MORE EXTERMINATION.—The *Limerick and Clare Examiner* of Saturday reports several cases of eviction and house-levelling at Moreland, near Limerick, on the property of Mr. Arthur, of Glenomers, who, or whose agent, seems to have acted with great harshness. It is said that several of the tenants not only tendered the amount due, but offered security for the next half year's rent. The same paper says, 'In the west of Clare, extermination still proceeds, in that very union of Kilrush in which the Minister was officially informed one thousand houses were demolished. The levellers were at work the whole of last week on lands at Carrigabolt, and hundreds of ejectments are still to be executed.'

DEPARTURE OF THE STATE PRISONERS.—Thirteen of the persons in custody for political offences, including Patrick O'Higgins, Mr. S. J. Meany, and J. Taaffe barrister, arrived at Kingstown on Friday morning, by the seven o'clock train, and were put on board a government steamer, which steamed at once from the jetty bearing towards the north. It is supposed their destination is either Carrickfergus, county Antrim, or Fort-George, Scotland. The prisoners were escorted to Kingstown by a large body of the metropolitan police. There was not the slightest excitement, nor was there apparently any sympathy for the patriots.

The number of mendicants in Paris, at present, is estimated at 9000.

Colonial and United States News.

THE COLONIAL AND UNITED STATES MAILS arrived on Friday morning. We glean from our papers the following items of news.

THE WEST INDIES.

THE REDDIE-TORRENS AFFAIR.

There remains now but little doubt that the steamer due here on the 25th inst., will bring us the final decision of this matter. In the meantime, Mr. Reddie, who knows everything by intuition, has written to his dupes that he is to be reinstated and is to be back to St. Lucia in a couple of packets; and, in order to give his assertions an air of verisimilitude, he adds, 'Tell Clement this, and tell your wife that. I have a number of nice things for the children, but I prefer to bring them myself when I come.' But the object of all this is nothing more than to 'raise the wind.' Mr Reddie had learnt by the steamer of the 10th of May, that the Colonial Bank at this place was about to sue him for some £400 sterling, and that not one of his friends was likely to come forward to pay the debt: and in order to induce them to do so, he pretends that he is to be reinstated forthwith, &c. In point of fact, the wily Doctor was quite correct in his calculations: for, with the same view and for the same purpose, the cry that he was to be reinstated had already been raised by his agents here, and had produced the desired effect of getting some dupe to come forward and pay the debt for him! However, let the friends of order and justice not be led astray by these tricks. We can assure them that Mr. Reddie will never return as Chief Justice to St. Lucia. Indeed, there is so little chance of his being reinstated, that in another part of his letter (not intended for general perusal like the rest of the story,) he says, 'I can count so little upon the committee of the Privy Council, that I have entered a fresh appeal to the Queen against the irregularity of the order for my suspension, and, as a dernier ressort, if all fails, we shall have the matter brought before Parliament. Brougham intends to try what may be done by bullying the House.' Now we have our doubts as to whether Lord Brougham would consent to make such a fool of himself: but if he does, he will find Lord Stanley and Lord Lincoln prepared to meet him on behalf of Colonel Torrens. The Iron Duke, too, who had abstained from interfering all along, has now taken up the affair: and Lord Brougham little suspects what a lesson he may catch from his 'illustrious friend' the modern Giant Killer?—*St. Lucia Palladium*.

TYRANNY OF COLONIAL JUDGES.

Under the above head the Editor of the *Falmouth (Jamaica) Post*, commences an article as follows; 'There must be something peculiar in the atmosphere of the British colonies—something, that influences learned judges who are appointed by government to administer the laws, in this portion of Her Majesty's dominions. Whenever a packet arrives, we invariably

look over the journals of our windward and leeward island contemporaries, to see what strange freaks have been played, by a Mr. Glanville of Dominica—a Sanderson of Grenada—another of Tobago—or a Reddie of St. Lucia: we look over our exchange files with a certainty of reading reports of monstrous outrages committed on the liberties of subjects by men who appear to be ill-qualified to administer the law.'

These frivolous prosecutions and persecutions against Editors by some of the Colonial Judges, do indeed present a sad commentary on the common sense and independent principles of these dignitaries. Who ever heard of a learned or distinguished judge prosecuting an Editor of a newspaper for a libel! Public men who are above reproach do not require the aid of such petty resorts to give them a character.—*Antigua Observer*.

HAYTI—SERIOUS MASSACRE.

It is with regret we have to mention a renewal of atrocities in Hayti. Since our last publication, four vessels have arrived, each bringing dismal tidings, and as many refugees from the scene of blood as are fortunate enough to make their escape. It is said that the president was taking a tour throughout the island, and that instead of exercising his authority to stay the enormous crimes which were being committed, he was using it to cause an increase of them. He had sent to the country parts, and mustered the largest possible number of the reckless and worthless portion of the black population to oppose all persons of colour.

The largest arrival of refugees is that of yesterday in the *Napoleon*, from L'Ans de Nord. They all confirm the accounts which have been brought by the other vessels, that the greatest atrocities have been committed, and that a number of the most respectable and influential inhabitants of the island have been cruelly murdered—that not only does the president sanction and assist in the perpetration of the most wicked crimes, but that he endeavours to prohibit parties who are made the victims of this barbarity from leaving the island—those who do escape, to use the words of the unhappy people who arrived yesterday, do so 'with the knife at their throats.' One of the vessels which has arrived here was fired at from the ports.

The unfortunate persons who have arrived—men, women and children—are naturally in great distress. The deck of this vessel presented a most appalling spectacle.—*Despatch*.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The *Newfoundland Ledger*, in allusion to the fishery and potato crops, says:

Although, notwithstanding, some partial failures, we may congratulate the inhabitants of this colony upon a fair average catch of fish upon this coast, and especially upon the coast of the Labrador; we fear we must at length be compelled to believe, from various statements that the potatoe crops are again rather extensively diseased;—and if this is really the case, as we believe it to be, the sooner the fact is known to the population at large, the better will it be, so far as respects any timely remedy or a falling back upon such other resources for the ensuing winter as may yet be within reach.

BISHOP HUGHES.—A complimentary Address, from the Catholics of Halifax, was presented to the above Rev. Prelate, on Thursday week, which elicited an eloquent and appropriate reply.

A soldier named John Jones, who was convicted for the murder of his corporal, has been condemned to death by the criminal court at Montreal.

UNITED STATES.

ANOTHER DIFFICULTY WITH MEXICO is likely to occur, in consequence of the seizure of American vessels, which had put into Vera Cruz without knowing of its transfer by the Americans to the Mexican authorities. These vessels, 18 in number, have cargoes which were admissible by our laws, but are rendered contraband by some recent Mexican law.—*Am. paper*.

DIED.

At Tryon, on the 23d ult., Mr. Donald McIntyre, aged 73 years. He emigrated to this Island from Admurchan, Argyleshire, Scotland, 46 years since, and has maintained during his residence here the character of an honest and industrious man.

At St. John's, N. F., on the 17th ult., after a short illness, Mr. Thomas Bambrick, Teacher, aged 31 years, a native of the County Kilkenny.—*Newfld. Times*. [The deceased formerly resided in P. E. Island.]

THE HON. WILLIAM LAWSON.—It is with deep regret, that we have to record in our obituary list the name of this aged and highly esteemed Nova Scotian, who resigned his spirit to Him who gave it, yesterday morning, at half-past one o'clock. Mr. Lawson was, for a long series of years, an eminent Merchant in this town, under the firm of Prescott and Lawson, the senior partner of which is still living. Mr. Lawson has been for many years a member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia; and for more than thirty years, prior to 1830, represented his native County of Halifax, in the General Assembly. In every relation of life duty was of paramount importance with him, and after a useful life, he has been gathered to his fathers, full of years, leaving to his numerous offspring an unsullied name, and an

impractical illustration to his fellow-townsmen, that "an honest man is the noblest work of God."—*Halifax paper*.
