OBITUARY.—There passed away at French River, New London, on 25th of August, one of the older and most respected residents in the person of Mr. George Anderson, who had reached the advanced age of 86 years and some months. Mr. Anderson was of the third generation that resided in the old homestead. His death occurred after an illness of two weeks, caused by injuries received in a fall. His wife, one son and one daughter are the near surviving relatives and have the sympathy of all. Mr. Anderson has been an active man, carrying on both farming and auctioneering business, which brought him into connection with a wide circle extending to Miramichi and Halifax.
