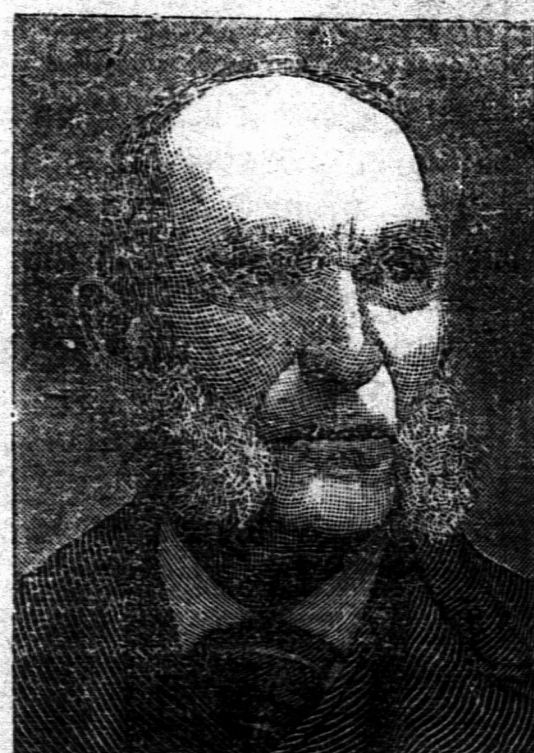

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION. MINISTERS AND LAYMEN IN COUNCIL.

The Prince Edward Island Baptist Association met with the church at Tryon Friday morning, July 1st, 1892.
Rev F D Davidson was called to the chair.
A short time was spent in social service after which the following officers were elected:
Moderator, Rev F D Davidson; Clerk, Dea. Arthur Simpson; Assistant Clerk, Dea. Geo W Warren; Treas. Dea. W B Howatt.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.
The afternoon session was occupied with Sabbath School work.
Rev E A Allaby presented the report. Interesting and practical papers were read as follows:
The Duties of Superintendent, by Bro E D Steros.
The Teacher's Commission, Bro Geo W Warren.
The Right Use of Lesson Helps, Bro Wm McLeod.
How to Teach, Bro Geo McNeill.
The Teacher's Reward, Dea. Wm Scott.
The evening session was devoted to a discussion of various phases of Sunday school work. Rev J Miles gave an address on "The importance of S S work." Bro J W Hlley (Lic) on "the co-operation of parents and teachers;" Rev C W Williams on "the religious power of S S work." The addresses evinced careful thought and a grasp of the difficulties encountered in the prosecution of the work. They were attentively listened to and cannot fail to have a profitable influence upon all privileged to listen to them.

SATURDAY MORNING.
After regular routine of business, Rev J C Spurr read the digest of letters which had been carefully prepared by him. The report which was a practical presentation of the standing of the churches and the work accomplished during the year furnished many interesting items of information. In answer to the question, "What is the greatest hindrance to the prosperity of the church?" the reply was, the worldliness of church members. The churches of this association have lost largely by immigration. Out of a membership of 1855 as reported last year, 305 are living abroad. In the discussion which followed the Digest of Letters many valuable suggestions were made by pastors and laymen.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.
The report on Denominational was presented by the writer, Rev J. Miles. The report, which was unanimously adopted, recommended to the patronage of Baptist congregations, the Baptist hymnal, Baptist book room of Halifax and the Messenger and Visitor. Dr. Saunders of the M. and V. was present and addressed the association in a pleasant and instructive manner.
The report on systematic benevolence, prepared and read by Rev. A. Freeman, was a plain and forcible presentation of New Testament teaching on this subject. The report was unanimously adopted.
Rev. A. Freeman also read the circular letter, subject, "The church: its character, duties and opportunities." The letter received the hearty endorsement of the association, and was recommended to be published in the M. and V. and also in the Charlottetown GUARDIAN.

The newly organized church at Bonshaw was received into the association and the right hand of fellowship extended to Dea. Cyrus Crosby as its representative.
TEMPERANCE MEETING.
Saturday evening's session was devoted to the subject of temperance.
An able and exhaustive report was presented by Rev. J. A. Cahill, and stirring addresses were delivered by Bro. J. W. Carter, (Lic), Revs F. D. Davidson, R. H. Bishop, J. A. Cahill. The speakers gave no "uncertain sound" on this important question. Total prohibition for the state and total abstinence for the individual were strongly urged. The religious and civil aspects of the case were discussed, and the teaching of these principles in the S. schools and common schools advocated. An advanced temperance sentiment was noticeable in all the speeches, and gave one the impression that the Baptist brotherhood of this island are the uncompromising enemies of the liquor cause.

The above services were duly carried out. Notwithstanding the heavy showers of rain throughout the day, the congregations were large, especially so in the church with which the Association was convened.
A service of prayer was held from 9 30

to 10 30 a m and from 6 to 7 p m. Rev J H Saunders, at 10 a m, preached a logical and most impressive gospel sermon. The annual sermon was preached at 3 o'clock by Rev F D Davidson, from the text: "Thy Kingdom Come," etc. The effort was a clear and forcible presentation of Scripture truths bearing on the extension of Christ's Kingdom and was specially suitable as a centenary missionary sermon. Rev. A. Freeman preached an earnest and impressive discourse in the evening, taking for his text: "God forbid that I should glory save in the Cross," etc. Addresses were also given by Father M. Ross and Pastor Allaby.

MONDAY MORNING SESSION.
The report on Education was read by Rev. J. C. Spurr and received for discussion. Interesting addresses were delivered by Revs. R. H. Bishop, J. O. Spurr, J. H. Saunders, Revs. F. D. Davidson, E. A. Allaby, J. A. Cahill and M. Ross. Rev. R. H. Bishop presented the report on Missions and it was referred back to the Committee to supplement with report on Home and Grand Ligne missions, the names of Revs. J. H. Saunders and Cahill being added. The thanks of the Association were tendered Rev. F. D. Davidson for the annual sermon and Rev. A. Freeman for circular letter.

Arrangement for travel: Rev J A Gordon and A W Sterns.
Sermon: Rev A Freeman, Alternate; Rev J Miles.
Circular Letter: Bro Geo Warren.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Opened with prayer by Bro Hlley. On motion Bro H C Carter (Lic) was invited to a seat in the Association as a laborer in the cause of Christ on the Island. The report on missions was next submitted, and discussed earnestly by Bro J W Hlley (Lic), Rev A Freeman, Rev J O Spurr, Rev M Ross, Rev J A Cahill and Rev R H Bishop. Report adopted.

In view of the fact that Rev J O Spurr had so faithfully discharged his duties the last year he was reappointed, to prepare the Digest of Letters for next. It was resolved that the Quarterly meeting be carried on in connection with the Association. Rev R H Bishop to be chairman and Rev F D Davidson Sec'y.
Bro Arthur Simpson and Dea. W B Howatt were appointed delegates to represent the Association at the Convention. Closed with prayer by Bro Geo W Warren.

LAST SESSION.
Monday evening session began with a service of prayer.
The subject was Missions.
Rev A Freeman spoke on the Grand Ligne mission, its origin, progress and needs.
Rev E A Allaby presented the claims of the Northwest Mission.
Rev C Spurr made an earnest appeal on behalf of Home Mission work, followed by Rev J H Saunders on the claims of Foreign Missions.
Rev M Ross also spoke on the Grand Ligne mission.
The speeches were much appreciated by the large audience.
A hearty vote of thanks was tendered by the Association to the kind friends of Tryon who had so royally entertained the delegates, also to the choir for services rendered, and to the Moderator and Clerk for the efficient performance of duty on the occasion.
Association closed to meet with the Baptist church in Charlottetown on Friday, July 1st, 1893.

A DECIDED CHECK Gladstone Losing Ground.

Desperate Fighting in Pennsylvania. Four Thousand Workmen versus Detectives.

[SPECIAL TO THE GUARDIAN.]
LONDON, July 6.—Election returns at 4.30 today show that 94 Conservatives, 66 Liberals, 9 Unionists and 5 McCarthyites have been elected.
The News admits that the Liberals have received a check and the Times says "the flowing tide in their favor has been absolutely stayed if not turned back. A campaign of profuse promises and unscrupulous calumny wherein Gladstone's personality has been excited to the utmost in a desperate attack upon the stability of the constitution left the mass of the nation unmoved."

LONDON, July 5.—One of the interesting and disappointing features of the day was the defeat of Henry M. Stanley at North Lambeth, where E. J. Caldwell, liberal candidate, secured 2,524 votes, against 2,304.
The story of Stanley's plucky fight and the boisterous opposition he received has already been told, but the district was too strongly radical for him to hope to carry it.

All during today Mr. Stanley and his wife drove about in a handsome carriage, decorated with the unionist colors, and made the tour of the polling places, where sometimes he was cheered and frequently hissed. His efforts, however, were all in vain, for in addition to the strong natural vote against him he had to contend with treachery in his own followers on the part of many who had promised their support and failed to live up to their promise.
Mr. Gladstone, this afternoon, in speaking at Dalkeith said: "If Scotland on mature deliberation wants Home Rule, she will get it as her right, but the Irish question certainly leads that of Scotch nationalization."

Desperate Fighting.

HOMESTEAD, Pa., July 6.—Desperate fighting has been going on all day between Pinkerton agents and the discharged workmen of Carnegie, Phipps & Co. The company wished to substitute non-union men, but the discharged employes to the number of four thousand watched the place night and day. This morning three hundred detectives tried to land from a small steamer, but the men resisted, and at once returned, and at 4 o'clock this afternoon 38 had been killed. The workmen built fortifications of steel bars along the bank, on which they mounted a small cannon and shelled the boat. The sheriff of the town has telegraphed the governor for troops. Fire has broken out and is spreading rapidly towards the mill. A number of explosions have occurred and the people are flying to the hills for safety.

The Silver Bill.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—The House refused to refer the Silver Bill to the Banking and Commerce Committee by a vote of 43 to 153.
