Hockey Beef

The date today is November 29, 1989; and I have just come from a hockey game at the UPEI rink (it was a game between the Business Society and Blanchard Hall). I went expecting to see a good game of hockey, but what I ended up seeing would have made Don Cherry cry.

It began, innocently enough, with the drop of the puck and then sound of a few sticks clashing; then I witnessed what refereeing has grown to in the 90's. "One bad call" was all it took; unvented aggression from all players on both teams began to build, then the stick-work began, and finally the gloves dropped.

I have but one question to ask Barb Mullaly and the Recreation Committee WHAT CAN BE DONE TO STOP THIS ???

The answer is a simple one: You could make the referees not make any more bad calls; that from what I've seen would probably be impossible. Maybe, you could take away the players sticks so that the aggression doesn't build; but then the referees would disallow goals in the dying minutes of a tie hockey game. How about this for a solution: sew the players hockey gloves to their jerseys; no, that wouldn't work because the only teams with players that know how to sew are the VETS and the BIO'S and they don't believe in aggression anyway (ha ha ha).
