Training Centres To Visit R.C.A.F.
MONTREAL, March 26 - Twenty leading French aviation journalists will be in Canada next week to look at major R.C.A.F. training stations including Centralia, training centre for pilot trainees of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. They will arrive April 1 on the pre-inaugural flight of Trans-Canada Air Lines' Paris-Montreal service.
The aviation writers, members of the Association des Journalistes professionnels de l'Aeronautique, will join officers of the French Government, the City of Paris and the Canadian Embassy in Paris for the flight which will mark the beginning of TCA's scheduled Paris-Montreal service.
After a short visit in Montreal, the French aviation writers will take off as guests of the R.C.A.F. for a tour of Airforce centres. At Centralia they will meet French nationals in training under the NATO agreement and will view the training school. Approximately 60 NATO pilot trainees are stationed at Centralia. The party will also be received at Trenton, headquarters of the R.C.A.F. Training Command. On April 4th, they will be at Rockcliffe, headquarters of the R.C.A.F. Air Transport Command and will visit the R.C.A.F. experimental and proving establishment and the photographic establishment based there.
Also on the agenda for the writers are tours of principal aviation industries including Canadair in Montreal, and DeHavilland and AVRO at Toronto. In Ottawa they will meet the Minister of National Defence, Hon. Brooke Claxton.

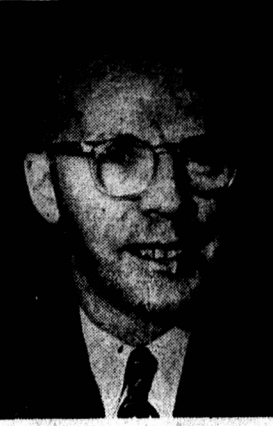

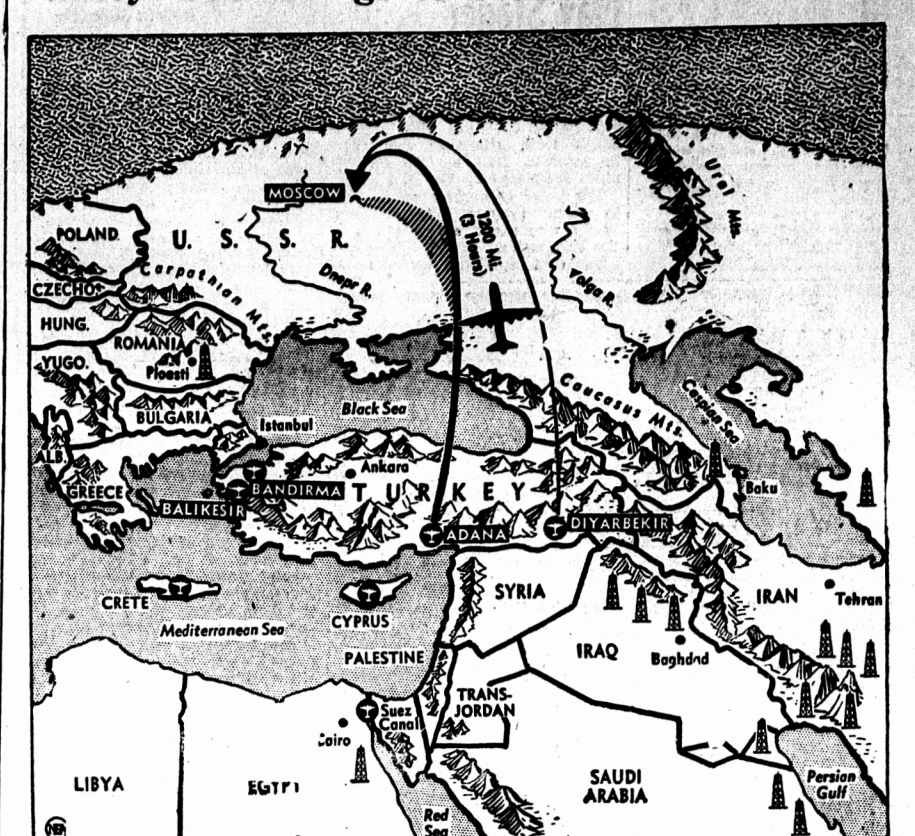
N. S. Midgets Break Even In Exhibitions

principle of fiscal need definitely established and recognized. However, the Federal Government strongly took the stand that heavy defence expenditures prevented it from considering any matters other than renewal of tax rental agreements and a program of old age security.
"With respect to old age security the federal plan calls for a contributory old age pension system of \$40.00 per month at age 70, the entire cost of which to be borne by the Dominion.
"It also proposed old age assistance on a means-test basis to be granted at age 65 with the costs to be borne equally by federal and provincial governments.
"At the instance of some of the Provincial Governments the Dominion also agreed to a constitutional amendment allowing the provinces to impose a retail turnover tax not exceeding 3 per cent.
"With regard to the renewal of the tax rental agreements, the Federal Government outlined the terms on which they were prepared to renew for a further period of five years from April 1st, 1952."
Mr. Darby said it might well be asked, with the expansion of governmental functions and the provision of additional services which require the voting of such a comparatively large amount for the purpose of administration, what assurance there is that similar sums will be available in the future to meet the Island's fiscal need.
"It is obvious," he said, "from a consideration of our estimated revenue where out of \$6,980,000, \$4,475,000 is contributed by the Federal Government, that source in the main must be looked to in order to provide the element of continuity. I will frankly admit, with the impending termination of the pre-

Diesel Service On Freight Run
MONTREAL, March 26 (CP) - Canadian National Railways announced today that diesel service on the 800-mile fast-freight run between Montreal and Halifax will be inaugurated about May 1.
A fleet of ten 3,200-horsepower locomotives, now nearing completion at Montreal Locomotive Works, will be assigned to the traffic.
Five of the new locomotives will be ready about May 1. The remainder will be put into operation as soon as delivered.
Before the service starts, the C. N. will conduct a 30-day training program in the Maritimes for quality crews. The courses will open about April 1 at Edmundston, N. B. with a two-unit diesel and an instruction car. Later the equipment will move to Moncton, Truro, N. S., and Halifax.

Sulphur Shortage Threatens In U.K.
LONDON, March 26 (CP) - British and American officials will meet tomorrow at the Board of Trade to discuss the critical sulphur shortage which threatens to curtail seriously British factories concentrating on rearmament and export commitments.
The United States is reported to have a big stockpile of sulphur. British industries which depend on sulphur have been advised that their allocation to meet normal demands during the next three months will be cut from 125,000 tons to 80,000. Paper, textile, rubber and steel fabricating plants have been particularly hard hit.
Latest reports suggest the U. S. Government is considering allocation of an extra 20,000 tons to Britain but before any definite decision is reached the general supply situation is to be examined by the U. S. National Production Authority.

Turkey Gets Wings to Neutralize Red Threat



American construction crews in Turkey are building air bases that will place the free world's bombers within one hour's flying time of the main oilfields of Russia and her satellites, and within three hours of Moscow itself. Much of the work is top secret. Newsmag above shows location of four major airfield construction projects, biggest of which is Adana, one of the best locations in the Mediterranean from the standpoint of supply and natural defence. Seaborne supplies to Adana can be protected by fighter screens from Crete and Cyprus. Defensively, the Turkish air bases will guard the great Middle East oilfields and complete Western air defense for the Eastern Mediterranean and the Suez Canal. In the Canal Zone itself, the Allies are building underground hangars at airfields from which planes might also bomb Russia in event of war.
