

Tragic Death Yesterday Of Mr. George T. Hardie

The tragic death occurred yesterday morning of a well-known Charlottetown business man, Mr. George T. Hardie, who was found dead in his office on Great George St. with a shot gun wound in his chest, apparently the result of an accident occurring while Mr. Hardie was trying to load the weapon. It is understood that he had been working since last Saturday on the gun, which had become rusty from disuse. When the body was discovered there was a cleaning rod on the table close by, a small oil can, screw driver and another tool.

Police investigation followed a report telephoned in to them that a local man, Mr. Earl Reardon, had heard the report of a gun. Mr. Reardon had passed Mr. Hardie's office less than a minute before and had spoken to him. The shot was heard about 11.50 a.m.

A jury was empanelled yesterday by Coroner Dr. I. J. Yeo, who announced that the inquest will be held in the City Hall at 3 o'clock today. Members of the jury include Messrs. Frank Acorn, Maurice Block, D. A. MacCannell, W. B. LePage, Samuel Kennedy, Allison Horne and J. P. Murphy.

The late George Taylor Hardie was born at Westmount, Montreal, Oct. 28, 1900, a son of the late Mr. Charles E. Hardie. He was a graduate of Westmount High School, Montreal and of Macdonald Agricultural College. He came to Charlottetown several years ago as manager of the P. E. I. Trust Company, which position he resigned to take over the management of a hotel in the Laurentians. Later he returned to Charlottetown and established the Hardie Agencies, where he became local representative of the Northern Installation Company, Saint John, the Ledore Company, Walkerville, and other mainland companies.

Mr. Hardie was greatly interested in community affairs. During the last war he was chairman of the Aircraft Detection Corps and served as chairman of the Charlottetown Air Cadet Committee. He was later awarded a plaque from the Air Force for special services rendered in connection with the Air Cadets.

Mr. Hardie also keenly interested in fish and game activities, and was particularly instrumental in establishing some of the game birds brought to the island.

His religious affiliation was with St. Paul's Church, of which he was an active member.

Mr. Hardie is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Dorothy Drysdale, of Montreal, and also by one sister, at present in Europe.

Arrangements are being made for the funeral service in St. Paul's church, after which the remains will be forwarded for interment to Montreal.

Death Yesterday Of Mr. John Cameron

Mr. John H. Cameron of Charlottetown, who was a barber in this City for 62 years, died yesterday evening at his home on the Malpeque Road. He was 87 years of age.

Mr. Cameron, who retired in 1946, was one of the oldest practicing barbers in the Dominion. In addition to practicing here he had been a barber in the United States and Newfoundland for five years in his youth.

He was one of the most popular men in his trade and also among the horsemen with whom he was closely associated during the period he was in the horse racing business. Mr. Cameron owned several fine mares one of the best of which was Betsy Cameron.
