NEW SCHOONER.—There was launched at Georgetown, on the 27th of October, from the shipyard of Hon. D. Gordon, a finely modelled schooner, about 105 tons, named the "Brendan," to class 10 years A1 in Lloyd's Register of British Shipping.

THE MACKEREL CATCH.—The Halifax Herald reports that the Mary Odell arrived at Fort Mulgrave recently literally filled with mackerel. They were caught at Crow Harbor, the fishermen having struck a bonanza by a large school entering the harbor.

HORSES AND GESE.—The St. John Sun says: Six cars containing 1,214 P. E. Island sheep and a car load of horses were attached to the Canadian Pacific freight, on Friday morning, the former bound for Watertown, Mass., and the latter for Brownville, Me.

SOMETHING MUST DROP.—The St. John police war has assumed formidable proportions, and the policemen, the majority of whom hate Capt. Rawlings, are rejoicing on the fact that officers Birchell and Wetherhead have laid an information against him for perjury.

POLICE COURT STATISTICS.—During the nine year ending October 31st, the police magis rate of Fredericton, N. B., has heard 245 cases and collected \$1,427 in fines, of which \$500 were for Scott Act violations. The number of drunks was less than for nine years past, being 93. Last year there 153.

A NICE LITTLE SUM.—Mrs. Chris. Moore, of New Glasgow, N. S., has very recently come into possession of a snug sum of money. Her husband, Lieut.-Col. McLellan Moore, of the 28th Mass. volunteers was a pensioner of the United States, and the other day Mrs. Moore received \$3000 pension arrears and is to receive \$30 per month during her lifetime.

CANADA'S CATTLE TRADE.—The Montreal Witness says: In three weeks the St. Lawrence will be closed to steamship navigation. The number of cattle which will have been exported from Canadian ports to Great Britain from the beginning to the end of the season will show a grand total of 121,000 head. Last year the number was 85,696. This is an enormous increase, and shows the importance of the cattle industry.

THEY WERE EXCITED.—Coroner Berryman began an enquiry into the recent drowning of the lads Young and Munde, at St. John last Friday night. The evidence brought out the fact that no less than five men had hold of the rope attached to the life buoy when Young jumped into the water, and they all, through the excitement, allowed it to slip through their fingers. The Common Council has appointed a committee to take action in providing some suitable recognition of Young's brave act, and will at once provide a life boat at Courtenay Bay, where the accident took place.

POLICEMAN SHOT.—A new St. John policeman named James Goslin, was, the papers state, accidentally shot in the police station at that place a few days ago. It appears that a fellow-officer named Boyle, while in the act of putting on his coat, swung it round and his revolver fell from his pocket, and striking the floor, was discharged. The bullet passed into Goslin's right thigh on the inside close to the body. The wounded man was attended by Police Surgeon Berryman and conveyed to his home in a coach. The wound may be a serious dismemberment.

A CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.—The Berlin National Zeitung announces in the most positive manner that Professor Koch, whose researches as to the existence of a bacillus in consumption have already given him a European reputation, is now ready to announce to the world, having concluded certain important experiments in which he has for some time been engaged, his cure for that malady. The new remedy, it is said, resembles the lymph in vaccination, it being proposed by its use to inoculate the patient with the tuberculous bacillus can no longer exist, and this without any danger to his general health, or causing the slightest pain. Professor Koch will be ready to practically test his invention in about six weeks.
