

Civil Defence Course Expected To Have 150

It is expected that about 150 members of civil defence organizations in the province will take the radiation monitoring course planned for Charlottetown and Summerside on Feb. 12, 13, 14, and 15.

In Summerside, the course will be held in Civic Auditorium and in Charlottetown at Prince of Wales College. They are to be evening courses, and will begin at 8 p.m.

COLLEGE INSTRUCTORS
 Instructors from the Canada Civil Defence College, Arnprior, Ont., will take part at both centres. They will be assisted by instructors of the provincial civil

defence organization. The course is designed to train persons in the handling of equipment used to determine the protective factor of various materials against radiation and also to determine the intensity of radioactive fallout.

Major Orin Simons, provincial civil defence co-ordinator, said yesterday that when the course has been completed all parts of the province will have persons trained in radiation monitoring. He said that the federal civil defence organization will also set up 10 radiation monitoring posts in the province.

Former Alberton Resident Receives Award For Rescue

ALBERTON — A former Alberton resident, Cpl. A.S. Harvie of Centralia RCAF Station has received his second award for bravery from the Royal Canadian Humane Association.

Cpl. Harvie was awarded the association's bronze medal in 1958 for saving a mother and son from drowning in an Alberta lake.

On Jan. 23 the association announced it has awarded him a bar to go with the medal for another daring rescue.

The corporal won his latest award when he spotted a boy and girl trapped by a treacherous undertow while swimming in Lake Huron off Grand Bend last August.

Stripping to his underclothes he dove in after the floundering swimmers. He grabbed them as the fast undertow swept them around the end of a pier and out into the lake. The girl, Beverly Ann Hoerl, 10, of 219 Sixth Avenue, Kitchener, was revived by artificial respiration 30 minutes later. Her cousin, John Carlson, 12, of Berea, Ohio, quickly recovered.

Cpl. Harvie is married to the former Gertrude Barrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Barrett of Alberton and they have eight children. He was manager of Alberton fishermen's cooperative for some years following the Second World War.

New Dems Plan Events

David Lewis, Toronto, vice-president of the national executive of the New Democratic Party, will be in Charlottetown on Feb. 15, when he is expected to address a dinner meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Provincial secretary-organizer of the party, Tommy Dunphy, said yesterday that Mr. Lewis will speak on the national medical plan proposed by the New Democratic Party.

 National party leader Tommy Douglas is scheduled to be in the province on March 5, when the New Democrats hold their nominating convention in Summerside to select a candidate to contest Prince County in the federal election.

Mr. Dunphy said that if Mr. Douglas arrives in the province on Sunday, March 4, he will address students at Saint Dunstan's University that evening.

Two other national party workers are expected to visit Charlottetown late in April, according to Mr. Dunphy. They are Miss Eva Latham, Ottawa, supervisor of the party's women's activities section, and Bill Pickett, Ottawa, secretary-treasurer of the party's youth section.

Mr. Dunphy said that the provincial party is planning to organize its own youth and women's sections.

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says a small disturbance in the vicinity of the Great Lakes will pass south of the region today, but the cloud shield that surrounds it will extend to most of Nova Scotia during the daylight hours. A few hours of light snow are also expected for the southernmost regions, but

accumulated amounts will likely be no more than a few inches. Regional forecasts:
 Halifax and vicinity, Eastern Shore: Clear; clouding over with light snow beginning in afternoon) clearing by evening; extremely cold; light winds. Low-high at Halifax zero and 15, Goshen zero and 10.
 South Shore except Yarmouth County: Cloudy with light snow beginning in the morning; clearing in afternoon; continuing extremely cold; light winds. Low-high at Liverpool zero and 15.
 Yarmouth County, Annapolis Valley: Cloudy; snowflurries changing during morning to light snow, and changing again in afternoon to scattered snowflurries; continuing extremely cold; light winds. Low-high at Yarmouth 5 and 18, Kentville 3 below and 13 above.
