

Sigs Nip Pistons; Bank Beats City

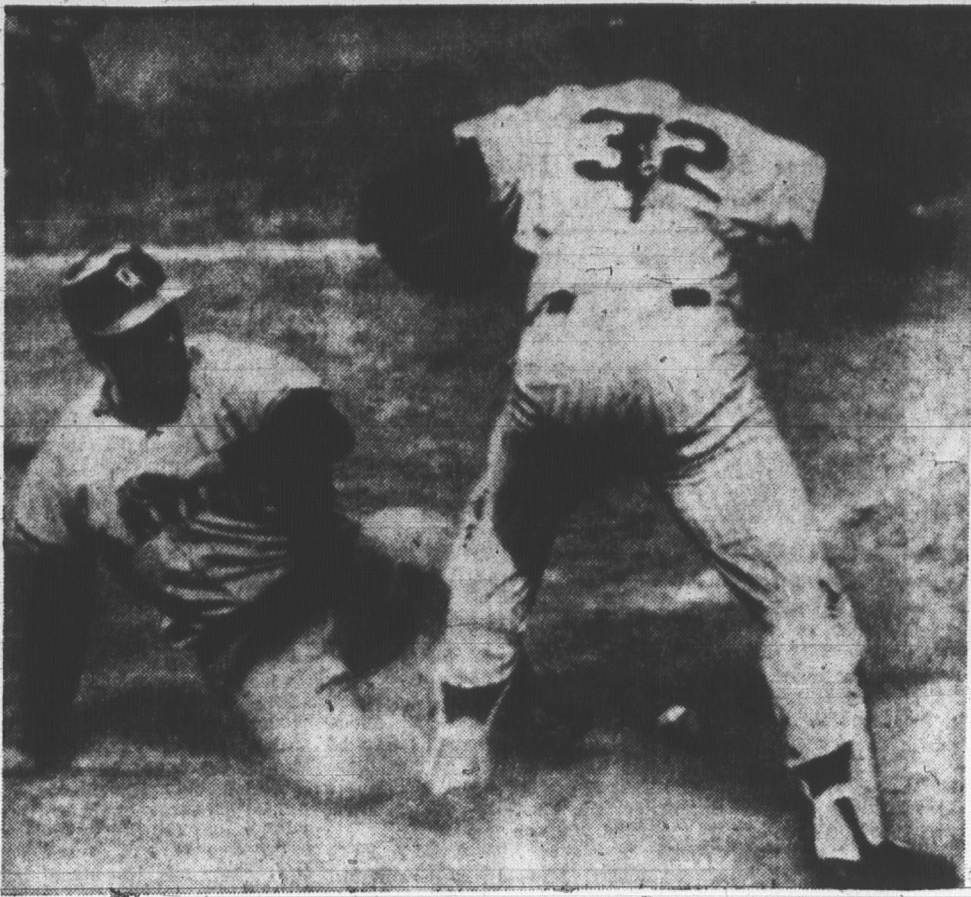

Edmonton Oil Kings Jr. Must Play In Own Class

 MONTREAL (CP)—Edmonton Oil Kings, this year's top Canadian junior hockey club, must compete against other junior teams in the 1966-67 regular schedule, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association ruled Tuesday.

The Oil Kings, Memorial Cup champions, have spent the last seven seasons playing against intermediate or senior teams because of a lack of competition at their own level in Alberta. The governing body for amateur hockey did not specify which junior league the Oil Kings will enter next season. The move came at the second general plenary session of the CAHA's 50th annual meeting. The sessions started Monday and will continue until Friday. The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, host to the parent body, had one of its recommendations partially accepted at the same meeting.

The QAHA won its bid to have the age limit for junior players raised to 21, but a similar recommendation concerning categories below the junior level was deferred for further consideration.

FIX EFFECTIVE DATE
 The change will take effect for the 1967-68 playing season and the alteration will leave junior ranks open to all players who are under 21 years of age on Dec. 31 of any playing year. Previously junior hockey was open to players who were under 20 years of age on May 31 in the season of play.

Thirteen Represent Canada

QUEBEC (CP)—The names of the 13-member team to represent Canada at the world ski championships in Chile next August, were disclosed Monday at the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association.

Named to the men's team were the eight skiers considered Canada's best, while on the women's team four persons were named as definite starters. The women's team is to be composed of Nancy Greene, Rossland, B.C.; Andree Crepeau, Sherbrooke, Que.; Karen Dokka, Burnaby, B.C.; and Carrie Matheson, Montreal. The choice for the final berth, to be made following study of performance during training, will be between Stephanie Townsend of Banff, Alta., and Judi Leinweber of Kimberley, B.C.

The meeting adopted a rule that will see assessment of a match penalty to any player who deliberately attempts to kick or otherwise injure an opposing player. The executive committee will deal later in the week with the association's agreements with the National Hockey League.

Body Is Found In Lake Ontario

TORONTO (CP)—The body in a life-jacket of one of four Toronto men who failed to return from a weekend motorboat cruise on Lake Ontario was found Tuesday.

All of the men were newcomers to Toronto. Mervyn Eakins, 23, and Joseph Eakins, 21, were from County Cavan, Ireland. Berkeley Smith and George Bryant, both 21, came from Thornleaf, Nfld., where they had fished the Grand Banks since their early youth. The four set out in Bryant's cedar-strip outboard runabout from Marie Curtis Park in suburban Long Branch at 10 a.m. Monday. When they were reported missing at 10:30 p.m., harbor police and the Canadian Coast Guard began a search. Police said the over turned boat, when found by the coast guard cutter Spray, contained life-jackets but no sign of the men.
