REGINA (CP) — The Saskatchewan government said Thursday it plans new and expanded programs to lift the province's buoyant economy.

Dr. Howard A. Buchner, his bald pate gleam, puffed his pipe and said: "Nonsense. I've never seen a bald-headed man with lung cancer."

That conversation three years ago was the seed of a research project. Today the results are in—the latest, if not the most striking, report on the incidence of lung cancer.

The conclusion of the two New Orleans physicians: Lung cancer strikes three to four times as often in men with bald spots than in men with bald spots.

U.S. Israel To Co-operate On Water Deal

NEW YORK (AP) — President Johnson announced Thursday night plans for United States co-operation with Israel in a search for ways to turn salt water into fresh water through nuclear science.

The White House said this would mark the first joint venture of the U.S. and another country in desalination research.

In an address to the annual meeting here of the American Committee for the Weismann Institute of Science, an educational centre at Rehovoth, Israel, Johnson said the United States is "equally ready to co-operate with other countries anxious to cure water shortages."

The president said that "water should never divide men—it should unite them."

Johnson apparently had in mind the Arab-Israeli crisis over Israel's plans to divert Jordan River waters to the Negev Desert.
