LOST HIS WATCH AND MONEY.—A despatch from Moncton to the St. John Sun says:—One Gillis, a carpenter from P. E. Island, lost his watch and money in a Vulcan street house kept by Downey.

THE "Flying Yankee" is to be withdrawn from the western end of the St. John and Boston route about the middle of the present month. The trips between Portland and Boston will be continued.

WE are informed by Mr. J. G. Hamilton Brown that whilst he was in England his brother, Charles E. Brown, and Edward C. Haythorne, left Gravesend, Eng., per steamer "Ballarat" for Australia.

The Moncton Times, referring to the place taken by the Island at St. John, says the prize list shows that Prince Edward Island has made almost a clean sweep in the departments allotted to horses and sheep, while its horned stock has also carried off a good many prizes.

A young woman named Elizabeth Murphy, was found dead in a house occupied by a Mrs. Ready in St. John, N. B., on Tuesday. The death occurred under suspicious circumstances. Mrs. Ready and her two sons were arrested on suspicion of having murdered the unfortunate woman.

THE competition for No. 3 Co's. Silver Cup, took place at Kensington Rifle Range, on Saturday last. Lieut. E. McGregor scored 103 points out of a possible 140, and carried off the prize for this season. Capt. Stewart came next with 102 points; Lieut. Longworth, who won the cup last year 99, and Sergeant Allan 97.]

THE Island Stock exhibited at the St. John Exhibition arrived home on Saturday night. They were taken from Point du Chevre in the steamer "St. Lawrence." The Prince County exhibit was landed at Summerside, and the Queen's and King's County stock was brought to Charlottetown. The steamer arrived at 1 o'clock on Sunday morning, and landed all the animals safely.

AN incendiary fire was discovered in the stable of Mr. John Connolly, Lower Spring Park Road on Saturday night. It was lit in the straw, and when discovered was burning through the roof. A few buckets of water sufficed to quench the flames. The fire alarm was sounded, however, and a general turn out of engines took place. The injury to the stable was slight.

PROF. SCHURMAN'S VACATION.—The London Academy of September 15th says:—Professor Schurman, of Dalhousie College, Halifax, Nova Scotia, has paid a long visit to Germany and England this vacation, and has obtained a grant of the Early-English Text and New Shakespeare Societies, yearly prizes for his English classes in the college. His last Shakespeare class numbered sixty-two. His examination paper is a most refreshing contrast to the Cambridge and usual English papers. He pays his pupils the compliment of believing that they have preception, judgment and imagination.

PERSONALS.—Prince George has returned to Montreal from his trip west. Sir Richard Cartwright is doing the Northwest, thanks to a Tory Government.

Lord Melgund, private secretary of the new Governor-General, Lord Lansdowne, and Lady Melgund are expected to arrive in Ottawa to-day.

Hon. A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia, is at present on a visit of inspection to the military camp at Louisville, Quebec. He was accorded a hearty welcome by the militia, and presented with an address by the Mayor.

EXCITEMENT over the failure of the Exchange Bank, Montreal, has been revived. It has leaked out that Craig, president and general manager, has made himself advances to a large amount. The definite sum is not positively known, outside of official circles; but it is estimated from \$150,000 to \$250,000. He asserts that his liability is covered by security. A strange feature is that the directors' liabilities in the last monthly report to the Government were sworn to be only \$19,233. This shows a great discrepancy, and shareholders are talking of holding a meeting for the investigation of the affair.

THE barge "William Great" broke away from her tug on the 27th of September, while on passage from Bay City to Detroit. The mate, two sailors, and cook, were blown ashore on a raft at Godrich, Ontario, on the 3rd inst. They left the barge on the 2nd, and after spending a terrible night on the raging waters were cast ashore at daylight on the morning of the 3rd. They had given up all hopes of ever reaching land and were in a used up condition when found. Part of the time they were waist deep in the water. They were lashed to the raft. The night was cold and a heavy gale blowing, which nearly caused their death. None had a mouthful to eat for many days, owing to the cabin being washed overboard, carrying everything away, with their clothing, provisions, etc., and leaving them nothing. During the day the captain and others of the crew were floated ashore on rafts, one of the sailors coming ashore on a piece of plank. Some of them were so weak and stupid from exposure, that it took great care to bring them around. The vessel has gone to pieces and the shore is strewn with wreckage.

THE FISHERIES EXHIBITION.—A special cable from London states that the awards of the fishery exhibition judges are now under final consideration. From information from various quarters there are good grounds for believing that the official announcement will show that Canada has obtained the following positions: First in stuffed fish, pickled fish, fish culture, refrigerators, fishing boat model, and fishing tugs. There is a very close contest between Newfoundland and Canada for the first position in dried fish. The relative positions have not yet been decided. Canada is strongly recommended for a prize for fish breeding apparatus.

An Interview with Post Office Inspectors.

PROPOSALS OF THE CONTRACTORS.

CAPE TRAVERSE, Oct. 8.

Messrs. Irving and Muttart, the Winter Mail Contractors at the Capes, had an interview in St. John, N. B., on Saturday, with Messrs. McDonald and McMillan, Post Office Inspectors. The improvements which the contractors propose for the present are: A boat house and a house for the men to live in on both sides—Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine—the house at Cape Traverse to be a comfortable building giving sufficient room for building and repairing boats. The contractors also propose the construction of twelve ice-boats and two water boats, that the houses on both Capes be included in the contract, and that the contract extend four years.

The inspector's views are considered and liberal in the matter. What they recommend to the Dominion Government will likely be accepted.

A Serious Railway Accident.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 7.

Last evening the brakes on a street car got out of order as the car reached the top of a steep grade on Sandusky street, Allegheny city. The car ran through the gate at the crossing of the Fort Wayne Railway and collided with a passing freight train. The car was wrecked, and all the passengers in it, twenty-five in number, more or less injured—two, fatally.

Orange Riots.

BELFAST, Oct. 8.

On Orange procession while returning from a meeting here on Saturday at which Sir Stafford Northcote spoke, was attacked by Catholics. A desperate fight ensued and many persons were badly wounded. One has since died.

Nihilist Proclamations.

BERLIN, Oct. 8.

The Ost Deutsche Zeitung says: "Nihilist proclamations have been issued, solemnly sentencing the Czar of Russia to death because he has failed to grant liberty to the people."

LONDON, Oct. 8.

The Solicitor of the Treasury has informed Mr. Gay, Solicitor, retained for the defence of O'Donnell, that O'Donnell's trial has been fixed for the 15th inst.

The Ann in Cause.

The Post says this morning that Governor Butler has detailed two State detectives to work up the defence in the Annam cause.
