

Shortage Of Engineers Canadian Road Building

QUEBEC (CP)—Provincial and federal delegates to the convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association reported Tuesday a common problem — a serious shortage of qualified engineers to keep pace with the country's giant road-building program.

A federal government official described the shortage as "critical" and provincial government spokesmen among the 1,000 delegates said their work also is being affected by the shortage.

Court Cases At Summerside

In County Magistrates Court, Summerside yesterday, Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C. presiding, a party from Miscouche was fined \$100 and costs under the Excise Act after he pleaded guilty to possession of illicit spirits (¾ gallon moonshine).

A party from O'Leary pleaded "not guilty" to a charge of taking a car without the owner's consent and his case was adjourned until October 9th.

Parties from Elmsdale and Summerside pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place and were each fined \$20 and costs, while a man from Summerside received a \$25 fine for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor.

A party from Albany pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention (speed) and was fined \$100 and costs having been previously convicted of offenses under the Highway Traffic Act.

Five other parties, also charged with driving without due care and attention, were fined \$10 and costs while another offender was ordered to pay a fine of \$12 and costs. A man from Albany was fined \$5 for failing to drive on the right half of the highway and was also assessed \$15 for driving without due care and attention.

A Summerside man paid \$1.00 fine for driving a motor vehicle without having it registered and \$5.00 and costs for driving without an operator's license.

A party from Fredericton had sentence suspended for 12 months after being convicted of stealing cedar posts.

Coroner's Jury Finds Death In Crossing Crash Accidental

A coroner's jury empanelled and sworn to inquire into the cause of death of Leonard James Lennox, who died on Sunday, September 23rd, at Albany after his car had been involved in a crash with a C.N.R. train at Arnett's Crossing, found that "the deceased had met his death under circumstances purely accidental and that no blame was attached to any member of the train crew." The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan and Mr. D.O. Stewart acted on behalf of the Crown.

Evidence was taken from Dr. Robert Smith, Bedecue, who had been called to the scene of the accident and who described the extent of the injuries sustained by the victim.

Lester Cameron, engineer of the train verified the evidence given by the fireman Clifford Haynes who had testified that all the required warning signals were in operation at the time of the accident, including the blinker lights on both sides of the track, the bells attached to the blinker lights, the bell and the whistle on the train which he said had been blown in warning and that the emergency brakes had been set in motion when it became apparent that the car would crash with the train.

Evidence was also given by student nurse, Jean Lickard who was present shortly after the accident occurred. She said she had taken the pulse of the man and found it quite strong but that she could find no evidence of pulse about a half hour later.

Corporal Chipman of the R.C.M.P., in charge of the Borden detachment at the time, stated that he had been at the scene and was joined there by Constables Lawford and Cox of the Charlottetown Detachment. By contact with Charlottetown the name of the owner of the car was obtained and it tallied with the name on the identification papers on the body of the crash victim.

Pictures of the accident taken by George Wotton, Guardian photographer were identified by him as those taken some time after the crash.

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Complain Unsanitary Material Used In Kiddies' Snowsuits

OTTAWA (CP) — Complaints that unsanitary material is being used for filling in quilted lining of children's snowsuits will get further study from the Canadian Association of Consumer's textiles committee.

Committee chairman Mrs. Michael Humphries of Toronto told the C.A.C.'s annual three-day meeting Tuesday the complaints will be "considered as a subject of the greatest importance." It would probably be studied by a special convener, she said.

Presenting her report to about 90 delegates and observers from eight provinces, Mrs. Humphries said the complaints reinforced others about unsterilized mattresses and other wadding. "This is a subject where CAC can accomplish a real improvement in conditions for consumers by asking for protective legislation and policing in this field," she said.
