**Local and Other Items.**

**SCHOOLS CLOSED.**—On account of the prevalence of the scarlet rash in St. Stephen, N. B., the schools had to be closed to allow the rooms to be thoroughly fumigated.

**A GOOD YIELD.**—From ten bushels of Early Rose and Empire State potatoes, Mr. Frank Dinsmore, of Chamcook, dug this fall 150 barrels. The ground, he said, seemed to be full of the tubers.—St. Andrew's Beacon.

**LIVELY OLD MAN.**—Mr. Luther Lawrence, of Bayside, 86 years old, went into his potato field the other morning and dug 13 barrels of potatoes before the breakfast gong sounded. Not bad for a patriarch.—St. Andrew's Beacon.

**FOREST FIRES.**—Forest fires have lately caused great damage in some sections of New Brunswick. Reports from Carquet and Iokerman say that at least sixteen houses and barns have been reduced to ashes and that large quantities of hay and potatoes were destroyed.

**BANK ROBBER.**—The private bank of Jacob Denhuder at Z Island, Mich., was broken into one night last week and the safe robbed of ten thousand dollars. The safe was blown to pieces by dynamite. A storm was on at the time, and the report was taken for a peal of thunder.

**ISLAND PRODUCE.**—Three schooners from Prince Edward Island are at present in port, retailing cargoes of oats, potatoes, and turnips. Oats are selling at 40 cents, turnips 25 cents and potatoes 35 cents, per bushel. Several other vessels with similar cargoes are on their way to this port.—North Sydney Herald.

**A NEW SCHEME.**—A new method of violating the lobster law has come to light in Maine. The law breakers save the eggs of all the shellfish found in spawn, and when they have saved up a bushel or more they put the embryo lobsters through a cider press and make wine of them. While the scheme is a rank violation of the statute protecting the lobsters, it does not violate the prohibitory law, owing to the small percentage of alcohol in lobster-egg wine.

**A DEMONSTRATION.**

**New Franchise Act Unfair and Unworkable.**

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—One benefit has resulted from the prohibition plebiscite, in that it has demonstrated to the Government the absolute weakness of the new Franchise Act. From all over the country complaints have been received respecting the incompleteness and unworkability of the provincial lists. Naturally the Government is disappointed at the result, and will endeavour to remedy the present defects next session by an amending bill. But what a commentary this will be on Liberal professions and practice.

Appropos of the prohibition plebiscite, the writs have not to be returned to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery until November 3, and a curious report is in circulation that, in some counties, polling is still being permitted by the returning officer. Such a thing hardly seems possible, but for the sake of the fair fame of the country emphatic contradiction should be forthcoming promptly. Probably what has given rise to the report is the increasing majority against prohibition in Quebec, to which the Soleil has been giving currency almost daily.
