# Leafs, Habs Win Saturday

TORONTO (CP) — With big winger George Armstrong leading the way with two goals and an assist, Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Detroit 4-2 Saturday to hop into sole possession of fourth place in the National Hockey League standings.

The loss ended Detroit's winning streak at six games and spoiled their chance of moving into a tie for second place with New York Rangers, who lost to Canadiens in Montreal. The Maple Leafs, who had been trying for a week to break their deadlock with Chicago Black Hawks for the No. 4 spot, finally made it by keeping behind the Red Wings all the way.

Rookie left wingers Earl Balfour and Dickie Duff were the other Toronto marksmen. Centre Dutch Reibel counted both the Detroit tallies. Sharpshooters Gordie Howe, who had counted 13 goals in the Wings' eight previous games, was frank to a single assist.

The first period ended with Toronto ahead 2-0 and both clubs counted once in the middle frame. Armstrong, a six-foot-one 205-pounder, settled matters with the only goal of the final period. Nicknamed the Big Chief because of his Indian blood, Armstrong now has 32 points, equalling his top production mark with the Leafs two seasons back.

## Interlocking Schedule Set Back At Least One Year

WINNIPEG (CP) — An interlocking schedule between the Eastern Big Four and the Western Interprovincial has been set back at least another year.

While both leagues went on record at their respective closed annual meetings Saturday as favoring the principle of an interlocking schedule, the W. I. F. U. deferred for one year any action and set up its own 40-game schedule for 1956.

Western delegates felt that none of the proposed interlocking schedules submitted for approval would prove financially advantageous to the W. I. F. U. clubs.

A committee will set up to look into aspects of such a schedule before it is brought up again at the 1957 meetings. The Big Four thought an interlocking schedule would be workable in 1956, both mechanically and financially. After Frank M. Bigson of Hamilton provided figures showing the cost of travel by air for each club.

A 10-man board, comprised of five representatives from each league, will meet today with an overall organization to deal with matters of common interest to both the big four and W. I. F. U.

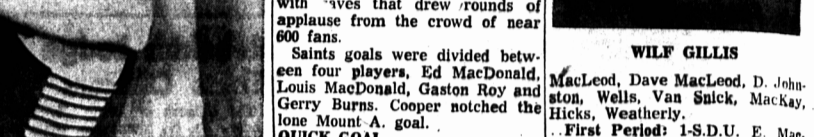

Old and new business was brought up to date and plans for the future discussed.

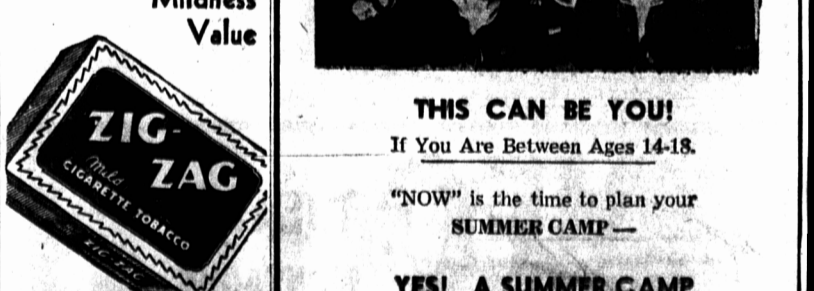
Both Mr. Beers and Mr. Walton tendered their resignation but were persuaded to hold office another term or until such time as some one else would take over.
