Mr. Parnell has "turned up" all right, and will speak at a meeting at Albert Hall, Nottingham, on Tuesday. He will reply to Lord Salisbury at the recent Conservative Conference, Nottingham. Mr. Arnold Morley and Mr. Henry Broadhurst, Liberal members of the House of Commons for Nottingham, will support Parnell.

The Montreal Gazette says that it is generally understood that Hon. Mr. Justice Johnson will be appointed Chief Justice of the Superior Court in succession to Sir Andrew Stuart, and that Mr. Justice Casault, of Quebec will be named Acting Chief Justice.

The widest circulation has been given to the statement that the Prince of Wales was a sufferer from Bright's disease. Dr. A. J. B. Jenner, Bishop of Cosmopolitan, addressed the Prince a letter on October 22nd to tender him the assurance that if His Royal Highness was really a sufferer from the disease in question he might find comfort from the fact that the disease is not incurable. The bishop said that as he had once before been of service to his royal highness in a critical time, he was again ready to be commanded. Under date of November 16, the controller of the royal household wrote from Marlborough House to the bishop, thanking him for his letter, and saying: "So far from suffering from Bright's disease, his royal highness has never known letter health than he is now enjoying."

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Emin Pasha's Condition.

ZANZIBAR, Dec. 6.

The condition of Emin Pasha is slightly improved to-day. He however in addition to the injuries to his head, received internal injuries when he fell.

LONDON, Dec. 6.

The Foreign Office has received a telegram from Zanzibar to the effect that Emin's skull is not fractured, and that recovery is possible. This is probably the judgment of Dr. Parke, and the diagnosis that there is no fracture of the skull is no doubt the basis for the favorable opinion given.

ZANZIBAR, Dec. 6.

Emin, who was unconscious for ten hours, was able to speak this morning. He hopes to reach here in ten days.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.

Sir John Macdonald is still unwell, and a cabinet council was held at his residence to-day.

At the coming session of parliament the government will be asked to grant money to defray the cost of taking tidal observations on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts.

The police authorities here have been asked to watch out for Silcott, the absconded cashier of the Washington sergeant-of-arms office, who recently cleared out with a Quebec girl named Thebaul, taking with him \$71,000. Silcott is supposed to be in Canada.

Jeff Davis Dead.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 6.

The sudden change in Jefferson Davis' condition took place about six o'clock in the evening, when, without any assignable cause, he was seized with a congestive chill, which seemed to crush the vitality out of his enfeebled body. From that moment to the time of his death, the case was that of gradual sinking. The body of Jeff Davis will lie in state in the City Hall till Wednesday next, the day of the burial. The Governor recommends that business be suspended on that day.

Not Satisfied.

MONTREAL, Dec. 6.

According to La Patrie, Chapleau is very much dissatisfied over the shuffle by which Colby was brought into the Federal Cabinet and Sir John Macdonald made Minister of Railways, and that he intends "retiring to his tent" shortly. Chapleau's friends have frequently complained that his party services are not appreciated by his leaders, who keep him in a position of no importance. [The above is evidently a Grit invention.]

Another Big Investment.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.

The Times says that English capital to the extent of \$100,000,000 is about to be invested in this country in a single enterprise. It will be what is known as a financing company. Its principal object is to provide credit for new American railway property by a system of insurance, mortgages and guarantees, furnishing all necessary support for new railway enterprises.

Settlers on lands granted by the Dominion Government to a Temperance Colonization Company in the Northwest in 1882 have written to the Government complaining that they are threatened with eviction by the Company who are anxious to get possession of their improvements.

In consequence of the employees in the dye department of the New Brunswick Cotton Mill going out on strike against a ten per cent. reduction in wages, Parks & Son are advertising for men to take their places.

LONDON, Dec. 6.

The Star announces from a reliable source that General Boulanger has been engaged to lecture in the United States and will deliver the first lecture in the New York Academy of Music.

Silcott's Big Scoop.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.

The special committee appointed to investigate the defalcation of Silcott, the cashier of the sergeant-at-arms, are in secret session to-day. The sum taken is now placed at \$71,800.

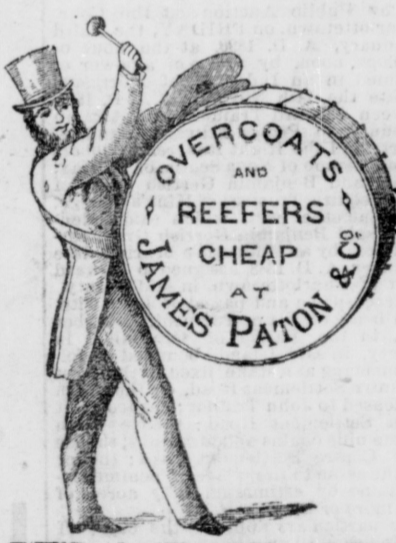
