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Regional High School, Vocational Discussed

Both a regional high school and a vocational training school entered the picture last night as residents of the school districts surrounding Charlottetown met at Prince of Wales College. The result was the formation of a fact finding committee to investigate the possibilities for a regional high school for the area, and also to study the circumstances for a vocational high school center.

Last night's meeting, chaired by Ralph Raynor, Southport, and representing some 45 school districts, was the culmination of several meetings held separately in the areas surrounding the city to discuss a regional high school.

The investigating committee will conduct its inquiry and then report to another general meeting and to the various districts.

As a Charlottetown group has already studied the matter of establishing a vocational school in the city, and presented a favorable decision to the government, it seems likely that the committee appointed last night will confer with the Charlottetown committee, as was suggested last night.

Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education, sketched the history of the development.

of education in the province, and noted the financial assistance available for the establishment of regional high schools and vocational schools. He answered questions from the floor on the topics under discussion.

Can't Change Ch'ships Site Says Rosburgh

HALIFAX (CP) — Jack Rosburgh, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said here Thursday it was too late to shift the location of the 1962 world ice hockey championships.

Rosburgh was commenting on Czechoslovakia's offer to hold the championships in that country in place of Colorado Springs, Colo. The offer arose from the refusal of the Allied travel office in West Berlin to give east German travel permits. This is part of a NATO ban because of the Berlin crisis.

Rosburgh said "There are so many considerations, not in the least of which is the tremendous financial investment made in Colorado. Money has been poured into the project and they need the meet to get some of it back."

No Opposition Appears Yet To Council Slate

Whether there are any contests or not at least there will be a full slate of candidates offering for the City Council and the mayoralty when the civic election is held Feb. 14.

Formal announcement by Charlottetown lawyer, John P. Nicholson that he will offer in Ward 4 for the seat vacated by James Haslam, means there will be at least one candidate for every seat at the council board.

The only other vacancy in the civic setup was for the seat on the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply left vacant by the death of chairman Roy Bevan. Recently Ezrie Taylor, local jeweller, announced his candidacy for the post.

Aside from these two spots every member of the present council is re-offering with Mayor A. Walthen Gaudet heading the list.

Mr. Nicholson will bring back to the council experience he gained as a former member in 1956 and 1957 when he held the chairmanship of the tender and fire committees. A former Crown prosecutor, and rated one of the sharper legal minds, he will be welcomed back, if elected, by other councillors who served at the board with him in the past.

Firemen Out In Sub-zero Weather

Charlottetown firemen were called twice in sub-zero temperatures yesterday.

In the first call at 3:45 p.m. fire in a two-storey home at 55 Eden Street caused extensive damage as firemen had to open second-story walls to extinguish the fire.

According to officials of the fire department the residence is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Williams.

Smoke and water damage to the upstairs rooms was reported as being "heavy." Some furniture was removed from the downstairs rooms as a precautionary measure.

The second call, at 8 p.m. was to a shed at 123 Upper Queen Street. The building was said to be owned by Robert Carver.

The fire apparently originated around heating equipment made from an oil drum.

The interior of the building was heavily damaged by fire and water.

Police Court Has 4 Cases

A fine of \$5 and costs or two days in jail was meted out to an accused by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court this morning on a charge of failing to stop at a "stop" sign.

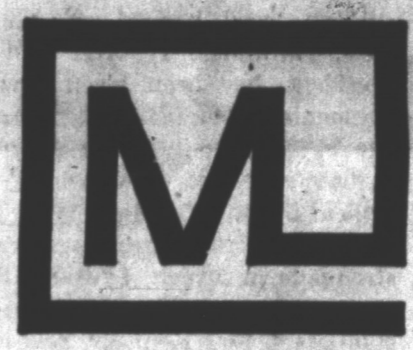
