Miss Margaret Paton Hyndman Q.C. is the international president of the Business and Professional Women's Clubs. The following is a short biography of Miss Hyndman as presented by Mrs. Marjorie Wightman Hyndman Coffin, member of the Business and Professional Women's Week committee in Charlottetown.

Margaret P. Hyndman is a senior member, Wegemast and Hyndman, barristers and solicitors, 17 Queen St. E., Toronto, Ont.; Director Toronto Advisory Board, Huron and Erie Mortgage Company and the Canada Trust Company.

She was born Palmerston, Ont. of Scottish ancestry.

Read law with F.W. Wegemast K.C.; called to the Bar of Ontario, 1926; created K.C. 1938 (the second woman to be made a K.C. but now one of more than twenty in the British Empire). Has specialized in corporation law, having assisted F.W. Wegemast, K.C. in writing a text book on Canadian Law, "Canadian Companies", published in 1931; has done legislative work in most of the Provinces of Canada; is the first woman in Canada to become a director of a Trust Company.

Has been and is engaged in executive capacities in a number of commercial companies; past president of a large knitting mill director; retail florist company; a thermometer manufacturer company; president, theatre company; president, selected "Woman of the Year" by the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women, 1952, in recognition of her work in obtaining Equal Pay Legislation in Ontario.

Miss Hyndman is past national president, Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs; Past Grand Dean Kappa Beta Pi (International Honor Legal Sorority); Charter Member and Past President, Zonta Club of Toronto; President, International Federation of Business and Professional Women; Member, Toronto Ladies Club.

Membership Chairman of International Federation from 1947 to 1956 during which time Federations were founded in Denmark, Austria, Switzerland, South Africa, S. National BPW President Sends Inspiring Message

A short resume of the career of Miss Isabel Menzies, national president of the Business and Professional Women's Club, is given before presenting her message on the occasion of Business and Professional Women's Week.

Miss Menzies was born in St. Andrews, Scotland and came to Canada in 1922. She is secretary of the Montreal Uptown Branch, Imperial Life Assurance Company and a member of the Quarter Century Club of that company.

She joined Montreal BPW Club in 1931 and served on the board of that club as entertainment convener, assistant secretary, secretary, budget convener and convener of the Red Cross group.

Miss Menzies was provincial president of Quebec for four years. She served as emblem chairman, advertising director, four years as a vice-president and two years as first vice president of Canadian Federation. She was elected national president at the Edmonton convention in July.

The following is the message from the national president, Miss Isabel Menzies.

This week the 7,000 members of the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs are celebrating their annual Business Women's Week with the objective of drawing attention to the achievements of business and professional women.

The Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs is not a social organization. It was established in 1930 by federal charter, for the purpose of promoting the interests of business and professional women throughout Canada.

The clubs in the Canadian Federation over the years have interested themselves in such projects as the appointment of women from every province to the Senate of Canada—the appointment of QUALIFIED women to policymaking administrative and judicial commissions and boards of government (municipal, provincial and federal)—women on juries—the repeal of policies and laws that discriminate against women—the support of the United Nations and its efforts to improve the status of women—active support of worth while community projects.

Mrs. Jack MacRae invited the members for next meeting. Collection amounted to 90 cents. The meeting adjourned. A delicious lunch was served by the hostess.

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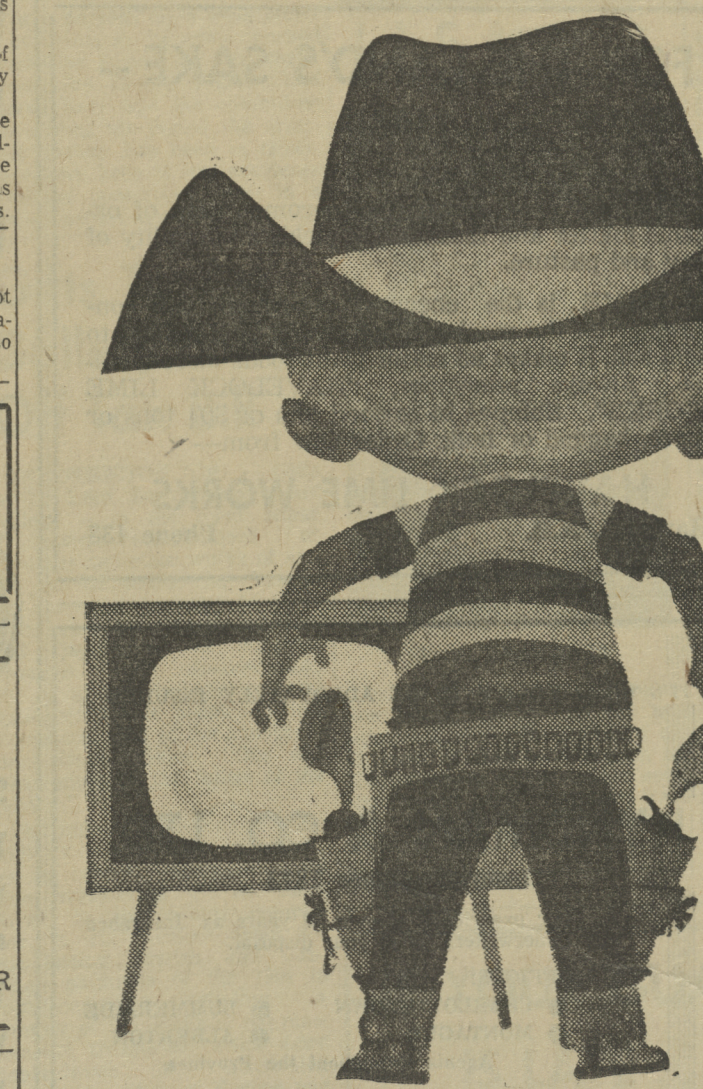
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AID FAR EAST
