Father Rescues Drowning Son

The swift response of a father to his son's peril saved Jarvis Mill, aged 12, of 15 Hillsboro Street from drowning yesterday at noon. The father, George Mill, jumped fully clothed from the Railway Wharf to rescue the boy. Jarvis, accompanied by Michael McAleer and Gary Mahar, was leaning over the wharf in an effort to sail a toy boat when he reportedly lost his balance and tumbled into the water. One of his companions, Michael, seeing the boy's predicament ran and told his mother who relayed the message on to Mr. Mill, at home at the time. The father ran to the scene and with the help of Mr. J. P. McAleer, succeeded in getting the boy to shore. The youngster was rushed to the Charlottetown Hospital by ambulance where he was found to be suffering from shock. The boy will be required to remain hospitalized for a few days.



TO REMAIN

Councillor Gerald R. Foster has bowed to the expressed wishes of many citizens and revoked his earlier decision to resign as a member of the City Council. In a statement carried in the press yesterday Mr. Foster disclosed that he had made his earlier decision in view of the fact that Council had failed to bring full disciplinary action to bear on both civic employees involved in the decision taken Monday evening. "Surely, the ancient adage that we 'cannot make fish of one and fowl of another' should apply," he said, observing later that "compromise is always dangerous since it can often destroy the principle it is designed to protect." "I also hope," he added, "that this unfortunate occurrence will not impair the proper functioning of the Council and that I will be afforded in the future the opportunity of serving my city and the ward I represent to the best of my ability."

Budget Will Benefit City In Sewage, Water Project

With the ten percent sales tax exemption announced in the Federal Budget Tuesday night being extended to municipalities on the purchase of sewage system materials, Charlottetown stands to save between \$10,000 and \$15,000 on the extension of sewage and water to the Spring Park area. Other items included in the budget on which municipalities will make a saving are culverts, fire truck chassis, fire hose, couplings and nozzles, structural aluminum for bridges and diesel fuel use in generating electricity. Also providing some relief will be the exemptions applying to classroom equipment such as chalk boards, desks, tables and chairs purchased by educational institutions.

Plan \$300,000 Building On Old Market Building Site

A two-storey civic centre costing between \$250,000 and \$300,000 will be erected on the site formerly occupied by the old Market Building, it plans proposed at Friday night's citizens meeting ever develop. Details of such a structure were outlined to the assembly by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, president of APEC, and principal of Prince of Wales College. The speaker suggested that to house the various community projects involved the building should be two storeys, double shell structure, with an auditorium in the center, art gallery above, market at one end of the ground floor, and the remainder of the space between the two shells rented out to the public. In order to attract outside art exhibitions the centre would have to be fully fire-proof and moisture proof, he said, adding that such a structure would be of "tremendous practical importance" particularly in view of the fact that the City possessed few notable attractions that might appeal to the summer tourist. Similar civic centres had been built in other Canadian cities, the speaker said. All had been "most successful". The meeting was attended by representatives of former market stall leasees, the Little Theatre Guild, the Provincial Drama Festival, Camera Club, Business and Professional Women's Club, and other organizations. Mrs. Bayfield Ellis was chairman, and Miss Lillian Duchemin acted as secretary. Dr. MacKinnon and Mrs. Ellis were appointed to head a committee charged with the duty of preparing a brief which will later be submitted to the federal, provincial and municipal governments. Other speakers heard briefly were: Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, Walter R. Shaw, Mr. Jack Spencer, and Harry E. Hyndman. Both Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Hyndman emphasized that they were speaking as private citizens. Mr. Shaw recalled that the former market building was the center at which thousands of rural and city dwellers met each week and exchanged views on affairs of the day. He warned that failure to provide a replacement for this urban-rural twice-a-week meeting point would be detrimental to the interests of City retailers. "I feel as a 'dual citizen' that the erection of some such suitable economic and cultural development is most necessary at this time," he said. He added that he would give such a project his "whole-hearted" support.

Special TV Broadcast Seen By Press At Local Station

A preview of things to come was provided for members of the Press and a number of invited guests at a closed circuit trans-Canada Television broadcast which was seen at CFXY television station at Strathgarny from 1.00 to 2.30 yesterday afternoon. Previous to the broadcast the guests enjoyed a luncheon at the transmitting station and were taken on a tour of the station by R. F. Large, general manager of CFXY-TV and of the micro wave receiving station by D.M. Gass, manager of the Island Telephone Company who also acted as host at the luncheon. His Honour Lieutenant Governor F. W. Hyndman and Dr. G.D. Steel, members of the CBC Board of Governors were special guests. QUESTIONS ANSWERED Simultaneous press conferences were being held across Canada. No interviews took place from Prince Edward Island but those in attendance heard questions asked and answered from nine different cities in Canada from Halifax to Vancouver. In the central control office at Toronto were J.A. Gaudet, general manager of the CBC and Thomas W. Eadie, president of the Bell Telephone Company. They gave a review of the progress made in radio broadcasting and in the field of micro wave transmission. The CBC with 139 micro wave receiving and transmitting stations across Canada is now the world's longest T.V. network. This network has been built by the trans Canada Telephone system, C.P.R. and C.N.R. telegraphs jointly provide television transmission to French network points in Quebec and to cities in Southwestern Ontario. The first all Canadian Coast to Coast TV broadcast will take place on July 1. Pickup points for the inaugural program will include Charlottetown where the camera will be centered on the Cradle of Confederation and nautical scenes off Victoria Park.

The Friday evening session will take the form of a Provincial B.Y.P.U. Rally. Speakers will include Charles Ballem, Rev. Malcolm Harlow, and the participants in the annual oratorical contest. The devotional speaker throughout the Association will be Rev. Keith Hobson of Summerside. Rev. C.W. Passey, Hazelbrook, will deliver the Association sermon Sunday morning. The climactic service Sunday evening will be addressed by Rev. Ross Howard, pastor of the O'Leary Baptist Church.

Western World Unites In Condemning Nagy Execution

ROME (Reuters)—Italy's ambassador to Budapest has been summoned home to report on the execution of Imre Nagy, Hungarian premier at the time of the 1956 uprising, Foreign Minister Pella told the senate Wednesday night. He said that as soon as news of the executions reached home, the Italian government "took the initiative of a multi-lateral consultation with our allies. This consultation is still in course." All but the Communist senators rose to their feet and shouted "long live freedom" as Pella spoke. The executions of Nagy and his associates, announced Tuesday without details of the time or place, continued to bring heated criticism from Socialists and Conservatives alike in the Western world. The Socialist International, in a statement issued in London, said "workers throughout the world, the Communist party included, will be shocked to learn of the secret murders—since that is what secret trial and execution without notice signify." In Copenhagen, the United Nations special committee on Hungary said it would "naturally collect information about the circumstances of the trial and sentences." At the United Nations headquarters in New York demands mounted for the UN to take action that will reflect grave concern over the executions. The first step would be an urgent meeting of the five-nation special committee on Hungary. The United States wants such a meeting and is consulting on it with other delegations. A committee member said there is growing sentiment for a meeting of the representatives from Australia, Denmark, Ceylon, Uruguay and Tunisia. In Oslo, several hundred persons braved a violent thunderstorm and drenching rain Wednesday night to stage a protest march to the Soviet Embassy and the Hungarian legation, heavily guarded by mounted and mobile police. The marchers, Hungarian and Norwegian students, delivered a written protest at the Soviet Embassy. Employer delegates of Western countries walked out of an International Labor Organization conference in Geneva when the Hungarian delegate began to speak. In Bonn, the ruling Christian Democratic party voted against participation in a proposed visit of a West German parliamentary delegation to Moscow in October. A spokesman said "current happenings" in Hungary was the chief reason for the decision. An appeal from Vienna asked athletes throughout the world to boycott sports contests in which Hungarian Communist representatives participate. BRITISH REACTION In London, Lord Birdwood announced he will demand in Parliament today the British government inform Russia of the effect of the executions on the prospects of a summit meeting. 'Good News' Is First Arrival

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Good News, owned by Jack Heddon of Hillsborough, Calif., Wednesday night was the first yacht to complete the Newport to Bermuda race. The 64-foot yawl finished unofficially at 8:24 p.m. EDT with the remainder of the fleet of 110 which left Newport last Saturday strung out for miles. Meantime, Windigo, a 71-foot yawl owned by Walter S. Gubelmann of Oyster Bay, N.Y., was headed for the finish line with a broken rudder. The yacht's rudder broke four miles from the end of the 650-mile race and the crew was manoeuvring it by sail handling alone. Good News was first sighted 14 miles northwest of Bermuda.
