It is not much wonder that Prince Edward Island should be treated in a left-handed way when our representatives at Ottawa appear to be doing their utmost to injure us.

"Had proper judgment been used the dredge could have been taken to Pictou and put on the ship there, and all the repairs could have been done in one month at a less cost than \$5,000."

A more barefaced slander than this was never uttered against the Island, and our position in the Commons is so helpless that not one of our members was sufficiently honest and independent to defend our Province against Mr. Welsh's libel.

The other member for Queen's is just as diligent as Mr. Welsh in his labors to injure the Province. The people of Mount Stewart have been petitioning for a wharf at that place.

Now, Collier says: "However, the insurrection went on, and the rebels made their first march to Durham. They had the five wounds of Christ represented in some of their colors."

I think a comparison of these passages will show that it was the North Counties rebellion of 1569 which was referred to.

The following from Emerson on the power of silence is worth preserving and remembering:

"What a strange power there is in Silence! How many resolutions are formed—how many sublime conquests effected—during that pause when the lips are closed and the soul secretly feels the eye of her Maker upon her!"

I have often wished that I could read Carlyle. I have attempted it over and over again, but never have been able to succeed.

"The whole world calls for new work and nobleness. Subdue mutiny, discord, widespread despair, by manfulness, justice, mercy and wisdom. Chaos is dark, deep as hell; let light be, and there is, indeed, a green flowery world."

This is a fine passage, and no little food for reflection. Dr. Chalmers said much the same thing, but how differently!—to my mind much more pleasantly, and far more effectually.

"Thousands of men breathe, move and live, pass off the stage of life and are heard of no more. Why? They do not partake of good in the world, and none are blessed by them; none could point to them as the means of their redemption; not a line they wrote, not a word they spoke, could be recalled; and so they perished; their light went out in darkness, and they are not remembered more than insects of yesterday."
