QUEBEC-LABRADOR IRON

Some 350 miles north of Seven Islands on the St. Lawrence River at the Quebec-Labrador boundary, geologists and engineers have discovered a vast area rich in high-grade iron ore. Engineers report that much of the ore may be extracted by the easy and quick open-pit method. A railway is being built from Seven Islands to the iron fields.

COST-OF-LIVING

Canada's cost-of-living index has been steadily rising for the past year. On Oct. 1st the index stood at 189.8. In other words, the Canadian dollar was worth 53 cents compared to 1939.

ST. MARY'S RIVER DAM

The St. Mary River Dam, 40 miles southwest of Lethbridge, Alta., was officially opened on July 17.

The building of the dam completes the first step in an irrigation project that will benefit some 500,000 acres in southern Alberta. The dam controls a man-made lake 18 miles long, 6 miles wide from which water flows to camps through a maze of canals and

ditches. It will take 10-15 years to complete the entire 30 million dollar irrigation scheme. The population of the United States is 154,353,000 persons.
