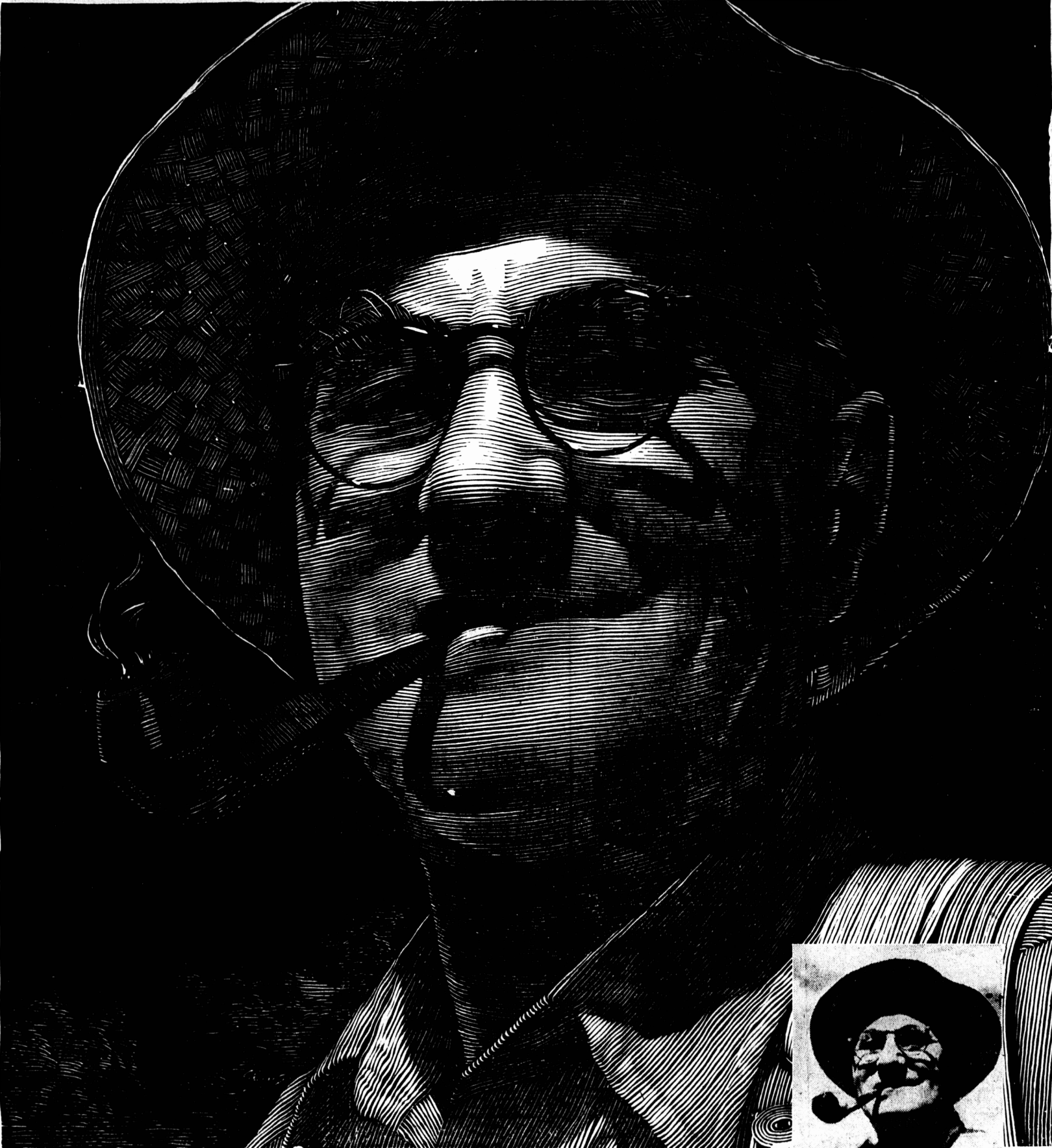

Owen E. Riddle, 56, is a plasterer who lives at 726 3rd ave. W., Calgary, with his sister. He is in business for himself. A native of Eastbourne, Sussex, England, he came to Canada with his parents in 1912 and settled in Calgary. His father was a plastering contractor.
