

DEW Line Will Need 117 U.S. Supply Ships This Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U. S. Navy announced Sunday it will undertake its biggest Arctic operation this summer, sending 117 ships with supplies to northern bases and equipment for building the Distant Early Warning radar line across the top of the continent.

Icebreakers, cargo ships, tankers and various types of landing ships will leave from both east and west coast ports soon to make their way to remote points along the Arctic perimeter of the continent. Each of the several separate supply expeditions will represent a race to get supplies and equipment in and the ships back out before the early Arctic winter closes sea routes with solid ice.

"Perhaps the most spectacular mission," a navy announcement said, "is moving material in for the DEW line. Shiploads of radar equipment must be taken up and around the top of the continent,

through Amundsen and Coronation gulf and Simpson strait, and left at the station sites."

FIRST SHIPS IN SOME AREAS

The eight icebreakers to be used will be equipped with helicopters to scout ahead for likely openings or soft spots in the ice. The announcement commented that the operations will take some ships into areas never before penetrated by sea.

More than 750,000 tons of cargo and almost 4,000,000 barrels of fuel and oil will be taken into existing radar and weather stations and to the new DEW line positions.

To tote the freight and carry personnel, there will be 60 cargo ships, 11 tankers, four passenger-type vessels and 34 other vessels including landing and drydock ships.

One task force, from Pacific ports, will meet with icebreakers and begin pushing east past Point

Barrow, at the northern tip of Alaska, about Aug. 1, to move on toward Cambridge bay and through Simpson strait. Another force sent pushing toward Greenland, Baffin island and other eastern points of the northern perimeter.

Oldest Member Passes, Alberton United Church

Mrs. George C. Gordon passed away last evening at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Green, Alberton.

The former Lucy A. Hunter was born at Alberton in October, 1861, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Hunter. As a young woman she moved with her family to the United States and a few years later entered Newton (Mass.) Cottage Hospital as a student nurse.

Graduating in 1894, she engaged in private duty until returning to Alberton to care for her aged parents who had again taken up residence there.

In 1906 she was married to George C. Gordon who predeceased her ten years later.

Becoming a member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in her early life, she entered with that body into Church Union in 1925 and at the time of her death was the oldest living member in full communion of Alberton congregation of the United Church of Canada. Throughout her life she was active in all phases of local church work and had a keen interest in the missionary enterprise. She was a life member of the Women's Missionary Society, a past president and later honorary president of Alberton Auxiliary. At one time she served on the executive of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery.

She was a charter member of Alberton Women's Institute and continued her active interest in the work of that organization as long as her health permitted.

Of a kind, generous and cheerful disposition, she had many friends. Always ready to give of her professional skill, she answered many calls, often when a doctor was available, and rarely did she accept any remuneration.

After her husband's death she continued to operate the Huntley Farm and care for her two young children and her aged mother. In 1926 she moved to Alberton where she had a small private

Alberton United Celebrates 124th Anniversary

Rev. Frank Archibald, Ph.D., Minister of St. John's Church in Moncton, was guest preacher yesterday at the one hundred and twenty-fourth anniversary services of the United Church congregation in Alberton.

Rev. Dr. Archibald chose for his text words from Acts 2:42 which have reference to the early Christians: "They continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers." He introduced his subject by asking: "What is the true Church?" and reminded his hearers that the Church is more than just another organization. It is the body of Christ—the Lord's own creation; it is the bride of Christ—something specially chosen and set apart; it is the sanctuary where God dwells. Following the text he stated that the true Church is a teaching church, it is a warm fellowship of Christ's followers, it is a fellowship with God in which His true presence may be felt; it is a place of prayer.

The entire worship centred about the church. It was conducted by the minister, Rev. Murray Gardner. The soloist, Mrs. Atkinson of Fredericton, N.B., gave a beautiful rendition of "How Lovely are Thy Dwellings," and the Alberton Male Eight nursing home for a time.

The last twelve years of her life have been spent in partial blindness and gradually failing health.

WILL STUDY ATMOSPHERE

MONTREAL (CP)—McGill University has signed a contract with the United States Air Force to investigate the chemistry of the upper atmosphere following various types of electrical discharge, including aurora borealis. University officials said an initial grant of \$10,000 has been made for the first year's investigation.

In the evening Dr. Archibald's subject was "Christ and Human Nature".

His text was "Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father, be glory and dominion for ever and ever" (Rev. 1:5, 6). The gospel, he said, is not what we do but what has been done for us. Referring to the need of human beings for the security of being loved, of their need of forgiveness, of their need for significance, and of being brought into the presence of God. He reminded the congregation that Christ has filled all these needs.

Lightning Causes Number Of Fires In Prince County

A severe lightning storm that hit P.E.I. early Saturday evening caused heavy damage at several points in Prince County, destroying at least one home and several barns on its tour of destruction. The five-room home of Mr. James Banks at Poplar Grove was completely leveled after being struck around 8:30 while the family was away on a shopping expedition. Fortunately they returned moments after the house was hit and saved some of the downstairs furnishings. Mr. Banks had some insurance.

Poplar Grove received its second strike of the evening when a lightning bolt ripped through the barn of Lewis Ramsay and destroyed a 30 by 60 barn and an attached hen house 14 by 30. Three calves, eighty hens and eleven young pigs were also lost in the fire. Mr. Ramsay and

family were returning from Tyne Valley when the lightning struck and although Mr. Ramsay made several attempts to save the calves, he was repeatedly turned back by the flames; 200 bushels of oats, a grain crusher, a tractor trailer and milk separator and other farm equipment were also lost. He also had some insurance.

At Enmore, Mr. Austin Campbell lost two barns, a binder, tractor trailer, hay fork and equipment and twenty tons of hay when a bolt struck one of the two adjoining barns about 9 o'clock. Fortunately there was no livestock in the barns. Mr. Campbell's house caught fire on two occasions and the entire contents were removed to safety, but fortunately with help from several neighbors the flames were extinguished before any damage occurred. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have seven children.
