Remembrance Day At Wheatley River

In the peaceful little village of Wheatley River the people of the surrounding countryside gathered in large number about the monument to pay their homage to those who gave their lives in the "great wars" of 1914-18 and 1939-45.

Under a clear sky as the people stood in silence the stillness was broken only by the ripple of the river below the "Cenotaph". Many silent tears dropped upon the cold November day. The service was opened at the monument with prayer by Rev. Lawrence Blaikie, followed by scripture reading by Rev. Howard Christie. The Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E. then read the names of the honoured dead, followed by a minute silence. Wreaths were then placed in loving memory of Warrant Officer Fred Bulman and Cpl. Leigh Coles by mother, brothers and sisters, in loving memory of Cpl. Lorne Cudmore by his mother, father and family. Wreaths were also placed by Mrs. Barbara McPherson on behalf of the Oyster Bed Women's Institute and by Mrs. Preston Rackham for the Wheatley River Women's Institute. This part of the service was brought to a close by singing "O Canada".

The service was continued in the hall with Major D. A. MacDonald, native son of this village, now of Moncton, N.B., as chairman. Opening hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past". Rev. Mr. Christie took for his theme, "Love thy neighbor as thyself". He drew a striking comparison that if a man was right the world would be right. Hymn "Oh God Of Love, O King Of Peace".

The Rev. Lawrence Blaikie followed. His high points were evil and its destruction, paying high tribute to those who sacrificed. Hymn "Oh Valiant Hearts". Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, was the next speaker. Mr. MacKinnon spoke with great interest in connection with the cold war in Europe and went into history regarding the great people of Europe, and felt that if they could be brought together in friendship the Asiatic nations would be brought into line of peace. Very fittingly he closed his address reading a verse from the hymn "O Valiant Hearts".

The Hon. Dr. MacMillan gave an inspiring address following the line of Christianity and prayer, paying high tribute to Canada. He said Canada was an example for the world to follow. Dr. MacMillan said he was proud to be associated with this service and the people of this community, it being

Treasure Van Of India Brought Back By S.D.U.

As part of its fund-raising scheme for needy students, the St. Dunstan's Committee of the World University Service is holding this week-end in the Charlottetown Hotel a unique sale of handicrafts from India. The sale was brought to Charlottetown last year along with an exhibition of jewelry chests given to the students of Canada by His Highness the Maharajah of Mysore. This year something special is added in the form of an alabaster model of the Taj Mahal also from India which should prove equally as fascinating as the silver and gold chests of last spring. The modest prices of the great assortment of gifts and ornaments, make the sale even more popular.

The Canadian Committee of this world organization has undertaken a student health centre in Delhi, India during the next year and all proceeds from the sale will be directed to this end. The St. Dunstan's Committee during the past six years has devoted most of its efforts to the support of D. P. students in Canadian universities, but this year its efforts are directed to the international program. By next fall it is hoped another guest student will be on the local campus.

The articles in the sale have been procured directly from India and the collection in Charlottetown represents the contents of the latest shipment. Many varieties in the Maritimes and Upper Canada have already had successful sales as the Treasure Van wends its way across Canada. The big event gets underway tomorrow morning in the Charlottetown Hotel when officials of the Province, City and College will welcome the Treasure Van.

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Chapel Altar Re-Dedicated At St. Dunstan's University

His Excellency Most Reverend James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown re-dedicated the altar in the Chapel of St. Dunstan's University at a special Mass sung by Rev. Louis Dougan at five o'clock yesterday afternoon, in the presence of a congregation which filled the chapel to capacity.

His Excellency referred particularly to the recent embellishment in the reproduction of the masterpiece of DuVind, "The Last Supper", which has been placed at the front centre of the altar and covers an area of twenty inches by three and one-half feet. The production is a base-relief beautifully executed by a master craftsman in oak which under a concealed subdued spotlight produces a lifelike and arresting effect. At the base of the plaque, a brass plate carries the following inscription: "Dedicated by Rev. Louis Dougan as a testament to the men of the Royal Canadian Navy and in memory of those who met death in service."

"On behalf of the students of St. Dunstan's University, and the Diocese, I am glad to extend thanks to Father Dougan for his generous gift" and express appreciation that we are honoured here today by representatives of Church and State". His Excellency said. He referred particularly to the presence of Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of the Province, and Councillor Alban Farmer representing the Mayor and the City Council.

"We are honoured to have Commander Brian Young of H.M.C.S. Dockyard, Halifax, with us, representing the Admiral in addition to other naval officers and men of the service. "We are beneficiaries of the men who made the supreme sacrifice," His Excellency said, "and we should re-dedicate our lives to a free world, striving to avoid a new conflict of a horrible nature with modern weapons which makes war too dreadful to contemplate."

"The one Power that can prevent such a catastrophe is contained in the words of the Master. I will send you the Spirit of Truth to guide you and be with you forever. The dreaded conditions of war can be largely diverted by prayer, without which man cannot be preserved," His Excellency concluded.

Rev. Joseph Whelby, R.C.N. Command Chaplain Atlantic Coast preached the sermon, taking his text from the Book of the Macabees, "It is holy and wholesome thing to pray for the dead." "We have the certain obligation to pray for those of our comrades who fought and died far from their Canadian homes," said Father Whelby in stressing the "Day of Remembrance". Seated in the Sanctuary were His Excellency Bishop Boyle, Monsignor Patrick McMahon, Monsignor Maurice MacDonald, Monsignor R. V. MacKenzie, Rev. Gregory Murphy, Rev. Father Coyne. The Faculty of the University also attended the service.
