

Preliminary Hearing On Negligence Charge

Preliminary hearings into the case of Edward Matthews, charged with criminal negligence in connection with the death of the late Joseph Frederick Steele on October 21st, 1956, opened in City Police Court yesterday morning before Magistrate K.M. Martin.

Evidence in connection with the death of the late Mr. Steele was given yesterday by Mrs. Hilda Marshall, Miss Merna Alchorn, Melvin Arsenault, Dr. Frank MacMillan, Mr. Harry MacLeod and Const. Gordon Humphrey of the R.C.M.P. The only information given yesterday, that had not been revealed at the inquest into the incident, was that of Const. Humphrey. The officer produced and explained photographs of the scene of the accident, in which Mr. Steele had been involved the night before his death, and the place at the Railway yard where he was discovered the following morning.

Following the hearing of evidence of the six witnesses, Magistrate Martin adjourned the case until this morning.

Three other cases also appeared on the docket. A person charged with being drunk and incapable was fined \$10 and costs for five days in jail, while another person appearing on a similar charge was sentenced to 10 days in jail. The case of a man charged with being drunk and disorderly was adjourned until November 23.

The traditional love of music, songs and laughter found expression last evening when several hundred persons of all ages faced the inclement weather to hear the Irish Minstrels of '56 in a gala performance in the Holy Redeemer Community Centre.

Presented by the Benevolent Irish Society and directed by Hugh P. Trainor with Albert Planchard as accompanist, the performers were introduced for their numbers by J. Plus Callaghan, C.D.A., who has had many years of success as an interlocutor and master of ceremonies.

In his choice of performers Mr. Trainor showed a remarkable insight in arranging a well-balanced program designed to meet the wishes of a critical audience, where Irish songs are concerned.

Following the opening choruses by the ensemble, Joseph Thistle sang "An Irish Welcome" and three charming young ladies each in turn sang most acceptably Elizabeth Morris gave the first number in "Peggy O'Neil" followed by Myrna Nicholson in "Mickey" and Fern Herman in "River Shannon Moon".

HALIFAX (CP) - The Halifax weather office says a storm centred over Western Quebec is causing strong winds, snow, and rain over a large part of eastern Canada. Strong southerly winds have brought extremely mild air to the Maritimes.

Winds will shift to westerly and gradually bring colder air to the district today. Showers will change to snowflurries.

MUSIC FESTIVAL AND MUSICIANS

The provision of records to help rural school choirs that have not the services of a skilled music teacher, is a new venture this year by the executive of the Prince Edward Island Music Festival. The records are being made of the test pieces that the choir will sing in the Festival competition.

The idea is that the teacher, or some other person in the district, can act as director of the chorus with the assistance of the records. The records are made by trained choirs under the direction of skilled and experienced teachers of music. The records are being made available to schools requesting them.

In this way the Festival executive hope that more rural schools will be able to participate this year than has been the case in the past. Letters have been mailed to all of the one-room schools in the province explaining the program of the record committee.

It has been decided by the Festival executive that a special class will be provided for school choirs trained by the use of records. In this way they will not be competing against choirs trained by professional teachers of music.
